## PSC Closes Lumen Investigation and Issues Findings

The Nebraska Public Service Commission has closed its investigation and issued its findings (<u>911-075/PI-248, 911-077/C-5581/PI-252</u>) into three separate 911 outages/disruptions involving telecommunications carrier Lumen.

The three separate outage/disruptions occurred on August 31, 2023, April 17, and July 9, 2024, impacting service over a wide area of Lumen's Nebraska network.

Through its investigation and hearings, the Commission found that Lumen's level of performance was not acceptable for Nebraska's 911 system and that the carrier failed to meet the level of service (five-nines) provided within its state contract.

In its Order, the Commission directed the State 911 department to identify potential changes to the state's current 911 system. To support that process, Commission consultant 911 Authority has begun independent verification and validation testing of the Next Generation 911 system provided by Lumen.

"The independent testing underway is important to determine whether Lumen is capable of fulfilling its contractual obligations to provide the level of service expected and demanded moving forward," State 911 Director, David Sankey.

# PSC Commissioners & Staff Attend NARUC Winter Policy Summit



Washington DC was the sight of the annual National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners (NARUC) Winter Policy Summit. The Winter Summit serves as a platform for NARUC members to discuss and exchange information on the latest developments related to utility regulations.

As part of this year's event, the NARUC Committee on Telecommunications chaired by PSC Commission Chair Tim Schram, held a panel discussion on Communication and Coordination between Utilities and Broadband Providers During New Broadband Deployment. Panel members discussed different states and their approaches to utilizing 811 and the rollout of BEAD funding placing a renewed importance on communication and coordination with out-of- state contractors.

An appearance by Georgia's 811 mascot Digger Dog served to drive home the important role 811 plays in the safe deployment of broadband.

# 911 Statutes Aligned as LB 362 is Signed into Law

In late January, the Commission provided testimony before the Transportation and Telecommunications Committee on <u>LB 362</u>. Sponsored by Senator Wendy DeBoer, the bill is clean-up legislation that ensures Nebraska's 911 statutes are consistent and aligned with current practices.

PSC State 911 department Director Dave Sankey provided testimony in support of the bill as did representatives on behalf of the Sheriffs and Police Associations, the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO) and the Nebraska Telecommunications Association (NTA).

The bill was advanced out of the TNT Committee to the floor, where senators quickly moved the bill without opposition. LB 362 was passed by the legislature and signed into law by the Governor in March and will take effect 90 days after the end of the legislative session.





#### **PSC Testifies Before the TNT Committee**

Commissioners and staff provided testimony in February and March on several bills before the Legislatures Transportation and Telecommunications (TNT) Committee. Four of the bills dealt with telecommunications and six bills focused on transportation and railroad legislation.

Commissioners testified in opposition of both <u>LB 4</u>, and <u>LB 311</u>. Brought by Senator Bosn LB 4 would establish the Telecommunications Exchange Deregulation Act. While LB 311 a Senator DeBoer bill aims to clarify regulatory authority for broadband internet access service in Nebraska. Commissioners offered to continue to work with both senators to find a more finetuned approach to the legislation.

Testimony was also provided in the neutral capacity on <u>LB 666</u> and <u>LB 176</u>. Proposed by Senator Storer, LB 666 would make a simple change to the Rural Communications Sustainability Act passed by the legislature in 2023. LB 176, brought by Senator Hughes would amend the Broadband Bridge Act to require applicants to obtain a resolution of project support from every county, city, and village in the project area. The Commission provided background on the application process and how the bill might affect it.

## TNT Committee Testimony Continued...

Bills dealing with transportation included <u>LB 347</u>, <u>LB 227</u>, <u>LB 465</u> and <u>LB 444</u>. LB 347, from Senator Prokop received testimony from the Commission in support of the measure which eliminates a section of statute requiring common carriers to obtain authorization from the PSC prior to issuing certain securities. Support was also provided on LB 227 brought by Senator DeBoer. Among other things, the bill would revise who has the burden of proof when transportation carriers apply with the PSC to operate as a common carrier. Testimony was also provided in support of <u>LB 37</u> and <u>LB 128</u> both dealing with railroad safety.

Opposition testimony was provided on LB 465 proposed by Senator Bosn. This measure if passed would remove the requirement for Uber, Lyft and other Transportation Network Companies (TNC) to complete annual vehicle inspections.

The Commission took a neutral stance on LB 444 brought by Senator Dungan. The bill would increase the minimum insurance requirements for rail crew transport carriers.

#### PSC Awards Nebraska Broadbridge Bridge Program Grants

Twenty-one grants totaling more than \$20 million were awarded by the Nebraska Public Service Commission from the Nebraska Broadband Bridge Program (NBBP). This is the 4<sup>th</sup> grant cycle administered by the Commission through the grant program.

During the 2024 grant cycle, the Commission received 27 applications for funding through the NBBP. Upon review of the applications and the challenges received the Commission determined 21 submissions would be funded. The grants awarded, submitted by four providers, totaled \$20,135,599. The awardees have until July 14, 2026, to complete their projects.

Through the four years of the program, the Commission has awarded over 140 grants, bringing broadband to more than 18,000 households.

"The Nebraska Broadband Bridge Program has proven to be an effective tool to help bring broadband to unserved and underserved Nebraskans," said Commission Chair Tim Schram.

Created by the Nebraska Broadband Bridge Act (Neb. Rev. Stat § 86-301 to 86-1310) the NBBP provides approximately \$20 million annually for the development of broadband networks capable of at least 100/100 Mbps (down/up) in unserved and underserved areas of the state.

# Commission Receives PRO-AG Grant Applications

Thirty-one applications have been received for the 2024/25 Precision Agriculture Infrastructure Grant (PRO-AG) program.

Created through the Precision Agriculture Infrastructure Grant Act, PRO-AG provides approximately \$1 million per year in funding to accelerate rural economic development by helping provide connectivity and supporting technology to farm sites in rural areas of Nebraska.



The PRO-AG program is divided into two distinct subprograms: Connectivity, and Devices and Technology. Each subprogram is designed to fulfill a specific purpose. Applicants were able to submit multiple project proposals but were required to apply separately for each subprogram. The full funding amount was not awarded during the 2023/24 grant cycle, and unawarded funding was carried over to the 2024/25 grant cycle. As a result, the amount of funding for each of the two subprograms \$564,538.85.

PRO-AG grants will be awarded by end of April. To date, the Commission has awarded over \$678,000 in funding through the program.

## Annual Hearing Held On TRS Surcharge

On March 11, the Commission held a public hearing on the Telecommunication Relay Service (TRS) surcharge. The hearing is held annually to determine the amount of the surcharge for the coming year.

The surcharge is utilized to carry out the provisions of the Telecommunications Relay System Act (Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 86-301 to 86-315) and provides funds to the TRS and the Nebraska Specialized

Telecommunications Equipment Program (NSTEP) for the coming year.



During the hearing Commissioners heard testimony from staff on the TRS fund, which included the recommendation to reduce the amount of the surcharge from its current .05 cents down to .04 cents. A letter from the Telecommunication Relay Service (TRS) Committee supporting the surcharge reduction was also submitted at the hearing.

Commissioners will use the information provided to determine the TRS Surcharge amount. If approved, the one-cent reduction in the surcharge would take effect on July 1, 2025.

#### **Cold Weather Rule Ends March 31**



March 31 marks the end of the Commission's Cold Weather Rule. The rule which applies to customers served by the state's jurisdictional natural gas utilities Black Hills Energy and NorthWestern Energy runs annually from November 1-through March 31.

The Cold weather rule prohibits both Black Hills and NorthWestern from shutting-off service to customers without allowing an additional 30 days to pay beyond the normal bill due date.

"With the cold weather rule coming to an end we encourage customers who may still be experiencing difficulty paying their bill to reach out to their natural gas utility," said Nichole Mulcahy, Director PSC Natural Gas Department.

The PSC implemented the cold weather rule more than 20 years ago, when it was given regulatory authority over the state's jurisdictional natural gas utilities. It is important to note that Nebraska communities with municipally owned natural gas utilities are not subject to regulation by the PSC and are not required to comply with the cold weather rule.


