

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is the fourth annual report prepared for the Nebraska Unicameral as required by the Telecommunications Act of 1986 (LB 835). This report contains information regarding the accomplishments and concerns of the Commission and the activities of the telecommunications industry during the past year.

This report is intended to help Nebraska State Senators and their staff, telecommunications policymakers, and the general public monitor the impact of LB 835, a major deregulation law adopted in 1986. This report has two broad perspectives. First, issues for legislation are presented and discussed to assist the Legislature in formulating policy for the 1990's. Second, because of considerable information compiled for research and administrative purposes, the report is to assist and serve as a tool for the industry.

This report contains facts and figures pertaining to the telecommunications industry in Nebraska. The Commission's recommendation for proposed legislation is the heart of this report. The Nebraska Supreme Court last year strongly emphasized the value of this report to the Legislature by stressing the obligation of the Commission to suggest additional legislation.

The objectives of this report are threefold:

Chapter One examines the quality of telecommunications services being provided to the citizens of Nebraska. The first section of Chapter One examines telephone complaints. A total of 301 informal complaints were received from telephone subscribers. This represents a 25 percent increase over the 241 complaints received in the last reporting period. As a result of complaints received regarding 900 services, the Commission adopted new rules and regulations in that area.

The last section of Chapter One examines the service testing of each of the central offices in the state. Quality of service is monitored through an on-site Commission testing program, one of the few Commission funded programs in the nation. Several concerns were expressed by customers this year regarding upgraded central office equipment. Ironically, some subscribers were dissatisfied with modern technology feeling the older system was less expensive and more suited to their needs. This occurred in fire stations, small businesses and residences. However, the majority of Nebraska subscribers appear to desire modern state-of-the-art equipment.

Chapter Two summarizes the availability of diverse and affordable telecommunications services to all citizens of Nebraska. This year, several new services sparked a lot of interest, such as caller identification, 911 service, deaf relay service and various unique calling features.

One of the most enjoyable tasks this year was creating a dual-party relay system. This project was a multi-agency, public-private enterprise. The Nebraska Commission for the Hearing Impaired, telephone industry representatives and an advisory committee of involved citizens worked hand in hand with the Public Service Commission on this worthwhile project. LB 240 was sponsored by Senator Tim Hall and became effective in 1990. Hamilton Telephone Company of Aurora, Nebraska was awarded the bid and service should be operating by January 1, 1991.

The most controversial issue the Commission faced was the availability and price of Extended Area Service within the Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Service Area. More than 400 letters and 750 telephone calls were received by the Commission in connection with this issue. Approximately 800 people attended the six public hearings the Commission held on the proposals.

Alternative services are expanding with local measured service available and optional calling plans becoming available to certain communities. Equal access to long distance carriers is expanding in our state. Twelve resellers of telecommunications services have applied for certificates in the past twelve months. Five applications were granted, two were denied, and five are pending.

Although currently not within the jurisdiction of the Commission, the summary of diverse services would not be complete without acknowledging that cellular, radio, digital, microwave, satellite and optical fiber services are available in Nebraska. Most of these services have been exempted from regulation by §86-808. Consultants frequently inquire about state regulation in these areas. Cellular service continues to grow and the Commission receives regular complaints and inquiries. The Commission recommends that registration of cellular services be legislated in order to monitor providers.

Chapter Three reports on the level of rates of local exchange and interexchange telecommunications companies. As in the past, the Commission is pleased to report that the telecommunications industry in Nebraska is very healthy.

In the last report, Commissions in 34 states and the District of Columbia had ordered rate reductions. In 1990, Kansas and Michigan were added to the list. Nationally, the second quarter of 1990 was the 14th consecutive quarter in which rate reductions exceeded increases. This trend helps explain why we have some telephone companies that have not had to increase their basic rates for decades, and why the Commission has recommended rate re-regulation the past four years.

Lastly, the summary section includes the recommendations of the Commission.

LEGISLATIVE RECOMMENDATIONS

Highest Priority

Repeal the sunset clause on the consumer's right to petition.

Repeal the sunset clause on de-averaging of toll rates.

Not Prioritized

Study whether Extended Area Service should be considered basic local service.

Allow subscribers 120 days (rather than 60) to petition the Commission and allow the telephone company to implement the proposed rate increase after 60 days of notice. This allows the public adequate time to petition while avoiding regulatory lag. Consumers would be granted refunds if the proposed rate increase is ultimately determined to be too high.

Reduce the percentage of increase that a company can implement from ten percent to five percent annually.

Reduce by one half the required percentage of petitioners for US West and Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Company subscribers. US West would then need one percent and LT&T one and one half percent of affected subscribers to petition before a hearing could be held.

Allow the Commission to review a company's rate of return if the company experiences a tax windfall.

Clear up the discrepancy on the dates when a company can reapply for a rate increase.

Change the standard from actual cost to fair, just and reasonable.

Recommendations in Areas Other Than LB 835

Mandate that failure to disclose the cost of a 900 call in a 900 advertisement is an unfair trade practice.

Allow the Commission to coordinate the 911 surcharge to assist Nebraska communities in utilizing 911 services.

Provide for a civil fine of not less that \$100 and not more than \$1,000 for offering telecommunications services or operating an automatic dialing-announcing device without proper authority.

It is hoped that this report will be a useful tool for the Unicameral to keep pace with the developments in the telecommunications field. The Commission offers its resources to assist the Legislature in enhancing affordable telecommunications service.

TELEPHONE COMPLAINTS

Pursuant to the Commission's Rules and Regulations, when a subscriber has a telephone complaint, the complaint shall first be made to the telephone company involved. If the telephone company fails to resolve the complaint to the subscriber's satisfaction, the Nebraska Public Service Commission will work with the subscriber and the telephone company to resolve the complaint.

During the twelve month reporting period, 301 complaints were received from telephone subscribers. Table 1 categorizes the complaints and shows a comparison to the number of complaints received the previous year.

Of the 301 complaints received, 87.0% were against either the Local Exchange Carrier (LEC) or an Interexchange Carrier (IXC). Table 2 provides a further breakdown.

The categories in Table 2 are explained more fully below. The explanation also includes examples of the types of complaints the Commission receives.

Local Exchange Carriers:

Local exchange service is provided by 37 regulated companies in Nebraska. Of these, the five largest companies serve all but 7.0% of the total access lines.

Table 3 shows the number of complaints received against each of the five largest telephone companies and the 32 other telephone companies and five co-ops.

These complaints exclude those received as a result of the LT&T Extended Area Service (EAS) proposal. They are reported in a separate section.

Complaints against Local Exchange Carriers (LEC's) are divided into three categories - service, billing and miscellaneous.

A complaint of trouble on the line, such as static, cut-offs during calls, or the line going dead are examples of service complaints.

Billing complaints usually arise when a subscriber has repeatedly asked the company to take a charge off the monthly bill, such as a long distance call which a subscriber disputed, but which continues to appear on the bill.

Another typical billing complaint involves refusal of service or disconnection. In many instances, the subscriber has a past due bill and has been disconnected. In order to reestablish service, the subscriber must pay the old bill and make a deposit. Similarly, a subscriber who now has service may be threatened with disconnection unless the past due bill is paid. In addition, the telephone company may require a deposit. In both of these instances, the telephone company's policy must comply with the Commission's Rules and Regulations. While these requirements may make it difficult for some people to obtain or keep their service,

it protects the telephone company from large uncollectible bills and other telephone subscribers from bearing the expense of the uncollectible accounts.

Other complaints are of a miscellaneous nature. Examples of complaints in this category are deposit requirements, harassing or obscene telephone calls, errors in directory listings, an error in the subscriber's directory advertising or trouble with privately owned coin phones.

Interexchange Carriers:

Complaints against long distance companies are often billing problems such as being back-billed for calls, receiving several months' billing at one time, or not being properly credited for a payment. Since equal access, there have also been complaints of a subscriber's long distance carrier being changed from one IXC to another without the subscriber's permission.

Alternate Operator Service:

Alternate Operator Services (AOS's) compete with AT&T and LEC operators. Typically, their service is through semi-public payphones and phones in hotels, motels and hospitals. Their rates may be higher than what people expect to be charged. In many cases, calls are routed to the AOS provider without the caller even realizing it.

Automatic Dialers and 900/960/976 Complaints:

Over this last year, the Commission received multiple complaints regarding automatic dialing-announcing devices and 900/960/976 information charges.

The Commission has registered the use of 31 dialers in the state. Those used for advertising or solicitation purposes have paid the fee of \$500 per device. Dialers are used in a variety of ways. To name a few, the Commission has licensed or registered a church, retail store, state agency, collection bureau and multiple insurance companies. The permit is valid for two years and then must be renewed. The Commission investigates complaints to determine if a valid license is held by the user of the device and contacts the user to disconnect if operating in the state without a license. The Commission contacts the appropriate law enforcement agency to enforce the act.

The Commission has assisted multiple households in regard to 900, 960 and 976 charges on their telephone bills. The 900/960/976 numbers are general information services such as weather or sports information, gab or talk lines, adult entertainment and children's programming. One can access these services through long distance carriers or local exchange carriers. The Commission received a number of customer complaints involving access by children and other unauthorized persons to these numbers without knowledge or

permission of the subscriber. Blocking of access to these numbers was offered, prior to the Commission ordering it, by GTE North and US West in Nebraska, however, it was not available across the state.

This past year, the Commission adopted a rule and regulation requiring each local exchange company to provide blocking of any of the 900 series numbers at no cost to the subscriber. This service is offered where facilities are available, only upon the request of the customer, and without interruption of any other services. The Commission also required that failure to pay for 900, 960 or 976 calls disputed by the customer would not result in a disconnection.

The Commission will continue to work with any household that has incurred bills due to misuse of the 900/960/976 services.

The Nebraska Public Service Commission has installed an instate consumer hotline. This toll free number has been heavily utilized this past year by Nebraska consumers.

SERVICE TESTING

To ensure telecommunications service is adequate, the Commission has emphasized the importance of service testing in all telephone company central offices in the state.

The Commission service evaluation program is designed to test and inspect every central office in the state once every two years. The percentage of local, EAS and toll completion tests which fail Commission objectives has steadily declined due in part to the installation of digital switching equipment, placement of fiber optic cable and improved central office maintenance procedures as recommended by the Commission staff.

During the first 11 months of 1990, the staff has conducted tests at 204 central offices throughout Nebraska. The majority of the central offices tested have met the Commission standards, however, follow-up tests and trouble report monitoring insure these standards will be met in the future in locations that fail to initially meet objectives.

The testing program includes placing local, EAS and toll calls through the use of a Northeast Electronics 41-3A central office analyzer. This equipment enables the operator to simulate subscriber usage by placing both dial pulse and touch tone calls using different loop and leak conditions. All trouble encountered is documented and corrected, if possible, and each company is informed of the nature of the trouble encountered when Commission objectives are not attained. Follow-up testing is sometimes necessary to insure trouble has been corrected and necessary maintenance performed at locations which initially failed to meet these objectives. All tests and inspections are designed to make certain each certificated local exchange carrier in Nebraska is providing adequate telecommunications service and is in compliance with Commission Rules and Regulations.


CENTRAL OFFICE DATA

Central offices are the heart of the telecommunications network and an essential element in determining the quality of service provided by local exchange carriers. The technology employed in these end offices impacts the availability of equal access as well as enhanced services such as call waiting, call forwarding and conference calling. Table 4 shows the type and approximate age of the technology used in Nebraska.

EQUAL ACCESS

Equal access is a coding method enabling telephone subscribers to choose a long distance carrier that will route and bill their toll calls. In exchanges where equal access is offered, subscribers access their selected long distance carrier simply by dialing a single digit. This is identical to the procedure followed in placing toll calls prior to the availability of equal access. Subsequent to selecting a long distance carrier, the local exchange carrier must code the subscriber's access line to route toll calls to the long distance carrier selected by the subscriber. In exchanges where equal access is not available, subscribers must dial extra digits to access the alternative long distance carrier of their choice.

In Nebraska, equal access is offered in 170 exchanges serving 673,735 access lines or 80% of the total access lines. Table 5 shows the exchanges where equal access is offered or will be offered on or before January 1, 1991, the local exchange carrier serving each exchange and the date each exchange was converted to equal access. The number of long distance carriers varies on each equal access ballot depending upon the interest shown by the long distance carriers in serving the exchange.

EXTENDED AREA SERVICE

Extended Area Service (EAS) is a service permitting subscribers in one exchange to place and receive two-way switched telecommunications to and from subscribers in one or more other exchanges without a toll charge. Several companies have a separate non-optional rate for the provision of EAS, which is itemized on the monthly bill, however, many companies currently have not established EAS adders to properly recover related expenses. those companies, EAS expenses are included in the cost of providing basic local exchange service and are recovered as a part of the basic local exchange rate. At present, 351 exchanges have either one-way or two-way EAS to 741,527 access lines or 88.1% of the total access lines in service (see Table 6). The Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Company provides EAS to 126 of its 137 exchanges representing 97.1% of their access lines in service. Historically, EAS has been provided on a non-optional basis, however, The Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Company initiated EAS service to the community of Ceresco on an optional basis. This may be a solution to future provision and pricing of EAS.

Current Nebraska statutes define EAS as separate from basic local exchange service, however, where EAS is provided on a non-optional basis, subscribers logically conclude that EAS is an element of basic local exchange service.

At the present time there are three EAS matters pending before the Commission:

On November 1, 1989, the community of Ashland filed applications with the Commission for extended area service to Omaha and to the Lincoln Common Service Area and Wahoo. A cost study submitted by The Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Company indicated that the rate required for the Lincoln Common Service Area would be \$23.34.

On February 6, 1990, the Commission opened a docket to elicit comments and suggestions for possible revision of rules and regulations governing extended area service. Comments have been received from AT&T Communications of the Midwest, Nebraska Telephone Association, Great Plains Communications, K & M Telephone Company and US West Communications.

On March 6, 1990, as a result of the pending applications of the Ashland community and other inquiries, the Commission ordered LT&T to file a plan within 90 days to offer EAS to all of its subscribers. A plan was submitted on May 4th which essentially replaced the existing EAS with a reduced rate of \$.125 per minute within a 25 mile radius and \$.22 per minute for calls over 25 miles within the LT&T area along with package plans within 25 miles of \$2.50 for 50 minutes, \$7.00 for 100 minutes and \$27.00 for 300 minutes. On May 24th the Commission directed the company to submit an alternative plan or plans which was done on August 31st. The

new plan calls for the same 25 mile calling area but reduces the rate per minute to \$.06, changes the packages to \$6.00 for 300 minutes, \$12.00 for 800 minutes, \$18.00 for 1,800 minutes and \$30.00 for unlimited calling for residence customers. In addition, the new plan calls for a uniform residence rate of \$11.00 and business rates of \$30.00, \$33.00 and \$36.00 depending on the size of the exchange. A flat rate option has been filed by the Save Our Service group. The Commission staff and the Community of Ashland have also made proposals. Six days of public hearing have been held throughout the LT&T service area. Thus far, the Commission has received over 750 telephone calls, 400 letters and several thousand petition signatures concerning EAS in the LT&T area. In addition, approximately 800 people have attended the hearings.

LINK UP NEBRASKA TELEPHONE PROGRAM

During the 1989-90 annual report period, the Commission was in the first full year of "Link Up Nebraska", a cooperative effort by the Commission, the Federal Communications Commission, The Nebraska Telephone Industry, The Nebraska Department on Aging, The Nebraska Department of Social Services and Nebraska Community Action groups. This program permits eligible telephone customers to receive a 50 percent reduction in the connection fee, up to \$30.00. The program also encourages the local company to work with the subscriber on deposits. To be eligible, a person must meet certain income guidelines established by the Commission. The National Exchange Carrier Association administers the program which is funded through an assessment paid by the long distance carriers. Matching funds from Nebraska are not required.

In Nebraska, the local telephone companies are largely responsible for the success of the program; notable mention goes to United Telephone, Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph and US West. Approximately 541 households have been provided with telephone service. Of those 541 households, approximately 456 are new customers. Link-up Nebraska is one of the tools needed in the state to maintain the 96% telephone penetration rate (number of households with telephone service). Despite the high penetration rate, the Commission is still concerned about maintaining telephones in homes in our state. This year the Commission modified the eligibility guidelines pursuant to an FCC change and asked all local telephone companies to amend their rate lists.

NEBRASKA DUAL-PARTY RELAY

LB 240, sponsored by Senator Tim Hall of Omaha, and enacted by the 1990 Legislature, creates a relay system to be operated by the Nebraska Public Service Commission with assistance of an advisory committee chosen by the Nebraska Commission for the Hearing Impaired.

A relay service provides specially trained operators who relay conversations between Telephone Device for the Deaf (TDD) users and hearing people who use a standard voice telephone. The relay operator types the hearing caller's spoken words to the TDD caller. The operator then speaks the typed words received from the TDD caller to the hearing person. The operator acts as a gobetween throughout the entire conversation.

The relay is also intended for the hearing community because it opens the doors to conversation between the speech and hearing impaired world.

The bill provides that the advisory committee include representatives from the Commission, the telephone industry, the Commission for the Hearing Impaired, the deaf, the hearing impaired, the speech impaired and the public at large. Members of the advisory committee are: Mr. Frank Landis, Mr. Norman Osland, Ms. Phyllis Large, Ms. Tami Nelson, Mr. James Kamas, Mr. Charles Doering and Dr. Robert Kellogg.

On August 28, 1990, the Commission adopted a statewide surcharge to implement the system. Funding for the dual-party relay system will be realized by implementing a surcharge of seven cents per month on each telephone line statewide. Those customers having in excess of 100 telephone lines would only be assessed the surcharge on the first 100 lines. LB 240 would have allowed a surcharge of up to ten cents. The surcharge is to become effective January 1, 1991, and will be billed by each customer's local telephone company. The Commission must evaluate the surcharge every year to determine what is needed to fund the program.

Once the request for proposal was drafted and reviewed by the state purchasing division, the project was let out for bid. Upon evaluation of the six proposals submitted to operate the relay the Commission with the advice of the advisory Committee, selected the Hamilton Telephone Company of Aurora, Nebraska to operate the relay. The service is expected to cost about \$560,000 the first year and \$1.3 million during the 30 months of the contract. The opening of the Nebraska Relay System is scheduled for January 1, 1991.

Phil Nelson, President of Hamilton Telephone Company, stated the company will be hiring about 15 additional people to operate the relay in Aurora and will start training in December of 1990. In order for the Commission to communicate with the Advisory Committee members, the Commission purchased a TDD and trained the staff in its use.

The Commission supported LB 240, introduced on behalf of the Commission for the Hearing Impaired and welcomed the challenges of administering this program. The Commission staff found the tasks rewarding and the people selected for the advisory committee to be knowledgeable, thoughtful individuals, who have volunteered many hours of public service. We at the Commission wish to publicly acknowledge the contribution of the advisory committee and the Commission for the Hearing Impaired under the direction of Tanya Wendel in this joint venture.

A review of the level of rates of local exchange and interexchange companies

BASIC LOCAL RATE CHANGES

Section III summarizes the financial status of the local exchange companies operating in the state of Nebraska. Statistics available for 1989 show that 20 Nebraska companies have achieved a higher rate of return for 1989 than was earned for 1988. The gross investment in telephone plant in Nebraska increased 10% from \$1.786 billion in 1988 to \$1.964 billion in 1989. Net operating income for Nebraska operations remained at \$104 million, a similar level to the 1988 results.

Local rate changes implemented during 1989 or pending at the end of 1989 consist of the following:

June, 1989 - Lincoln Telephone Company increase of \$2,200,000 in basic local rates under provisions of LB 835.

July, 1989 - Plainview Telephone Company increase of \$16,000 for basic local service under Nebraska Statute (§75-609) allowing for up to a 30% increase in local rates.

December, 1989 - United Telephone Company of the West increase of \$340,000 in basic local rates under provisions of LB 835.

December, 1989 - Cambridge Telephone Company application pending at year end. The Commission authorized the Company to increase rates by \$134,328 in May of 1990.

December, 1989 - Great Plains Communications application pending at year end with Commission authorization for rate equalization finalized in May of 1990. Commission order granted equalization of rates with no additional revenue generated from the plan.

The Commission staff reviewed the financial position of the companies listed above as well as Consolidated Telco and Consolidated Telephone Company. The table following lists the rate changes implemented by local exchange companies for the period of 1980-1990. If no rate changes took place during this period, the date of the most recent rate change is listed in the final column. Of the 38 companies listed, 17 have not had a rate increase during the 10 year period. Seven of these companies have had no increases for 15 years, and one company has maintained rates for over 30 years.

The statistics on the following pages provide a comparison of the rates of return for local exchange carriers for 1989. The information is compiled from the F.C.C. annual report Form M. The results of three of the companies, United, U.S. West, and Great Plains Communications, represent intrastate operations only. All other results reported are combined operations.


Graph number 1 shows the weighted ave.a, business and residential one-party rates for GTE, LT&T, United, U.S. West, and the 34 other local exchange carriers. The weighted average for the 33 companies serving fewer that 5,000 access lines is \$15.25 for business one-party and \$9.27 for residence one-party service. The F.C.C. report on Trends in Telephone Service indicates that in October of 1989, the national average for flat rate residential service with unlimited calling was \$12.28 per month.

Weighted by Access Lines



1989 Rate of Return



REDUCTIONS IN TELEPHONE RATES ORDERED BY STATE PUBLIC UTILITY COMMISSIONS

In our last edition we reported that rate reductions by states since 1987 when LB 835 became effective totaled \$2,091,900,000 for 1987, 1988 and the first quarter of 1989. By the end of 1989, the total of net reductions had reached \$2,724,000,000. In 1990, states have issued 17 rate reduction orders and seven orders approving increases, for a net reduction of \$429,700,000 for the first six months. The total of net reductions through the first six months of 1990 is, therefore, \$3,153,700,000. The second quarter of 1990 was the 14th consecutive quarter in which state rate reductions exceeded increases.

In the last report, 34 states and the District of Columbia had ordered reductions. In 1990, Kansas and Michigan were added to the list. These states are:

Recommendations

LEGISLATIVE RECOMMENDATIONS

Highest Priority

Repeal the sunset clause on the consumer's right to petition.

Repeal the sunset clause on de-averaging of toll rates.

Not Prioritized

Study whether Extended Area Service should be considered basic local service.

Allow subscribers 120 days (rather than 60) to petition the Commission and allow the telephone company to implement the proposed rate increase after 60 days of notice. This allows the public adequate time to petition while avoiding regulatory lag. Consumers would be granted refunds if the proposed rate increase is ultimately determined to be too high.

Reduce the percentage of increase that a company can implement from ten percent to five percent annually.

Reduce by one half the required percentage of petitioners for US West and Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Company subscribers. US West would then need one percent and LT&T one and one half percent of affected subscribers to petition before a hearing could be held.

Allow the Commission to review a company's rate of return if the company experiences a tax windfall.

Clear up the discrepancy on the dates when a company can reapply for a rate increase.

Change the standard from actual cost to fair, just and reasonable.

Recommendations in Areas Other Than LB 835

Mandate that failure to disclose the cost of a 900 call in a 900 advertisement is an unfair trade practice.

Allow the Commission to coordinate the 911 surcharge to assist Nebraska communities in utilizing 911 services.

Provide for a civil fine of not less that \$100 and not more than \$1,000 for offering telecommunications services or operating an automatic dialing-announcing device without proper authority.

GLOSSARY OF ACRONYMS AND TERMS FOR DEFINITION PURPOSES OF THIS REPORT ONLY

Access line: A basic subscriber line connecting the user and the telephone company central office.

AOS: Alternative Operator Services, operator services provided by companies other than AT&T Communications.

BOC: Bell Operating Company, Regional BOCs, are the seven companies such as US West formed with divestiture.

Digital: Signals using discrete values or conditions, as opposed to analog systems.

Equal Access: The process that allows subscribers to use other long distance carriers on the same basis as AT&T Communication. A subscriber to any long distance company can access one's chosen long distance carrier by dialing 1+ the number to be called, not a series of access numbers.

Fiber optic: New cables using glass fibers to transmit carrying signals. It can carry video and audio signals and has superior reliability when compared to pairs of twisted copper wire.

IXC: Interexchange carrier, a provider of long-distance service.

LEC: Local exchange carrier, a provider of basic local service.

900 Numbers: An audiotex service where a computer provides simulated voice prompts for activities such as telephone banking, retrieving recorded messages, sports scores, weather information, children and adult services.

PSC: Nebraska Public Service Commission.

Rate of Return Regulation: A method of regulation that allows a regulated firm to earn revenues equal to its cost of service, including a fair return to stockholders.
