EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is the ninth annual report prepared for the Nebraska Legislature as required by the Telecommunications Act of 1986, also known as LB 835. This report provides information regarding the activities of the telecommunications industry during the past year.

This information is intended to assist State Senators and their staff, as well as the general public, by providing data regarding the telecommunications industry, its operations, financial status and service quality.

LB 835 drastically changed the regulatory structure of tele-communications in Nebraska by removing rate setting authority. However, the Commission continues to actively monitor the quality of telecommunications services rendered to customers and the entry and exit of carriers in the communications field. The Communications Department conducts on-site office testing for service quality, audits the telecommunications companies financial reports, assists customers in resolving disputes with their carrier, and licenses all telecommunications carriers that wish to do business in Nebraska.

The Commission has also remained active with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in Washington, D.C. by responding to rule making proceedings and inquiries. Important issues, such as ADA requirements for the Telecommunications Relay System and Universal Service Fund changes, are a few of the topics in which the Nebraska Commission has filed comments with By filing these responses, Nebraska has been able to the FCC. participate at the federal level in telecommunications policymaking.

The recent passage of federal telecommunications legislation in both the House and Senate have made 1995 an exciting and important year for the Commission. The final outcome of these bills will most likely be finalized within the next few weeks. Statutory changes and rule and regulation alterations may become necessary in order for our state to comply with the new federal mandates. Some speculate that the federal legislation may bestow additional authority upon the states to regulate the telecommunications industry.

The Commission has opened two investigatory dockets in 1995 to study the issues of local competition and state universal service funds, topics of great importance in the congressional legislation. The information gathered in these dockets will be useful to the Commission, as well as the Legislature. The Commission looks forward to working with the Legislature to

promote economical and competitive telecommunications services for all Nebraskans. Also, in efforts to become more efficient and to improve its operations, the Commission is conducting an internal review of its present functions and is studying changes that will benefit our state's regulatory environment in the future.



Review of the Quality of Telecommunications Service Provided to Nebraska Citizens

1. Telephone Complaints

Customer complaints normally begin with the customer contacting the local telephone company. If that fails to solve the problem, the customer can seek assistance through the Commission by making an informal complaint. Most informal complaints are satisfactorily resolved. Informal complaints can, but rarely do, evolve into formal complaint proceedings. In 1994-95, five formal complaints were filed with the Commission. Formal complaints are discussed in detail later in Part I.

The Communications Department filed five departmental complaints during the year against interexchange carriers. The departmental complaints concerned carriers that were offering telecommunications services in Nebraska without a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity and certificated carriers that were violating the Commission's Rules and Regulations.

Of the 598 complaints received in the past year, 98.6 percent were filed against a local exchange carrier (LEC) or interexchange carrier (IXC). Table 4 breaks this down as follows:

A. Local Exchange Carriers:

There are 42 LECs in Nebraska (including cooperative telephone companies) ranging from US West with 525,762 of the total access lines to Sodtown Telephone Company with only 87.

Table 5 shows the complaints by company. As can be expected, the largest number of complaints involve US West Communications and the Lincoln Telephone Company. These two companies serve more than 82 percent of the local access market.

The Communications Department divides complaints into three categories for record-keeping purposes: service, billing, and miscellaneous. Complaints involving service include static, interference, cut-offs, and outages. Several large areas in Nebraska experienced fiber-optic cable cuts affecting service to many subscribers throughout Nebraska. These outages are discussed in further detail later in this report on page seven.

Miscellaneous complaints have steadily increased during the past few years and include harassment calls, demands to establish various optional features, requests for extended area service (EAS) and equal access.

Billing complaints concern private pay phones with costly surcharges, directory billing errors and deposits.

The complaints pertaining to 800 and 900 numbers were combined this year. A description of these problems is provided later in this section.

B. Interexchange Carriers:

The Commission received more complaints in 1994-95 concerning IXC's(commonly known as long distance carriers) than the previous year. In last year's report, 116 complaints were filed against interexchange carriers. In the present report that number has nearly doubled to 224. There are now 133 long distance carriers operating in Nebraska.

The complaints received by the Commission have occasionally involved "slamming" (the switching of a customer from one long distance carrier to another without the customer's consent). However, slamming complaints are relatively minimal. If a subscriber thinks his or her long distance carrier has been switched, he or she can call (700) 555-4141 to determine which company is assigned to your number. There is no charge for this call. Many subscribers call to complain about the aggressive marketing being conducted by the carriers. The Commission becomes involved by notifying the long distance company to remove the subscriber's name, telephone number and address from its telemarketing lists, as well as its direct mail lists.

The number of IXC complaints has also increased due to 800 and 900 number informational calls. This activity has caused problems for consumers, businesses, hotels, schools and churches statewide. A thorough account of this problem is provided Additionally, many hotels and motels in the next section. offer long distance service through carriers that charge significantly higher rates than AT&T, MCI or Sprint. People who stay at a hotel/motel believe they are using their calling card or that the phones are automatically connected to a major network, when in fact, they are being charged at higher rates by smaller telecommunications companies. When a person contacts the Commission regarding this confusion, attempts are made to review the charges and to request the carrier to re-bill at the tariffed AT&T rate. Generally, the Commission's involvement is successful.

2. 800 Complaints / Pay-Per-Call

Pay-per-call services, (traditionally thought of as 900 number calling services) appeared in the telecommunications industry through 800 numbers in 1994. This caused a great deal of confusion, as many people thought 800 numbers were toll free. Numerous complaints were filed with the Commission because many calls had been completed without the subscribers' consent. Churches, schools, hotels, businesses and residences were affected by this activity. A block, like that currently offered for 900 numbers, is not a feasible option, since it also restricts long distance calling.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has studied this issue to determine what changes are necessary to limit this activity. The official results of this inquiry will be helpful to curb this ongoing problem. To help consumers in this area, the Commission has actively worked with the local exchange carriers, as well as the pay-per-call companies, to obtain credit for these subscribers. The Commission notified all the local-exchange carriers in Nebraska of this activity and requested their compliance to resolve these matters quickly and efficiently.

3. Formal Complaints

Commission Rules and Regulations permit an individual to bring a formal complaint to the Commission if an informal complaint cannot be resolved. From July 1, 1994 to June 30, 1995, five formal complaints against various telephone companies were filed by consumers.

In a formal complaint proceeding, defendants are given the opportunity to satisfy the complaint without further Commission involvement. This outcome occurred in two of the formal complaints. One such complaint was filed by the State of Nebraska, Division of Communications against U.S. West. The Division of Communications alleged US West was providing inadequate service due to a series of fiber optic cable cuts that occurred in Nebraska from October to December, 1994. After working with US West, the Division of Communications was satisfied that the company was taking the proper steps to provide toll-route diversity in its future network additions.

The second complaint which was resolved between the parties was filed by the Gnostic Orthodox Church in Geneva, Nebraska against Lincoln Telephone (LT&T). The complaint alleged LT&T was providing inadequate service because it omitted the Gnostic Orthodox Church from the white page listings in the York Area Directory. A settlement between the parties was reached, as LT&T agreed to offer the Church a free listing in the Lincoln Area Telephone Directory Yellow Pages.

Other formal complaints filed with the Commission during the past year were from John Ball of Lincoln, Nebraska and Senator Ernie Chambers of Omaha. Mr. Ball's complaint centered on his cellular service provided by Lincoln Telephone Cellu-After hearing the matter, the complaint was dismissed for lack of jurisdiction in this area. The complaint filed by Senator Chambers alleged Sprint Communications Company placed an unauthorized block on his state government phone line located After a hearing, the Commission determined at the Capitol. that Senator Chambers was restricted from receiving telephone calls, that the procedure Sprint used to implement the block was flawed, and that inaccurate information explaining the reason for the block was provided to the Commission and to Senator Chambers. The Commission dismissed all other allegations in the complaint.

The fifth complaint was recently filed by Robert Herzog of David City, Nebraska and is presently pending. His complaint alleges Lincoln Telephone, US West and AT&T have provided inadequate service because the companies failed to verify several third-party calls charged to his telephone number by a caller in Omaha. Mr. Herzog has refused to pay for these charges since the third number charges were not authorized by him.

4. Consumer Toll-Free Hotline (800) 526-0017

On June 3, 1988, the Nebraska Public Service Commission introduced an intrastate toll-free number for consumers. The hotline has been heavily used and has enabled citizens of all income levels across the state to reach the Commission for inquiries and assistance free of charge. The Commission is making efforts to inform citizens of this number and the assistance the Commission provides. A quarterly newsletter was initiated in 1995, informing county officials, civic organizations and state agencies of the Commission's operations.

5. Service Testing

The Commission is dedicated to ensuring that Nebraskans are receiving adequate telecommunications service. Its effort has gained national recognition for the emphasis it places on the importance of testing every telephone company's central offices. Each central office is tested at least once every two years by the telecommunications technician. In an effort to monitor the switched network, 361,304 test calls were placed for the twelve months ending June 30, 1995. Tests were conducted with 14 of the 37 telephone companies in 209 central offices.

The technical division continues to provide an integral connection to quality telecommunications service. On-site testing provides first-hand information to the Commission regarding each company's facilities and offers assurance to consumers that technical assistance is available from a source outside the telephone company. The Commission's technician has also visited several homes and businesses across the state during the past year to assist the Commission in resolving service complaints and problems.

PART II

Review of the Availability of Diverse and Affordable Telecommunications Services to the People of Nebraska

1. Local Competition

Competitive access providers (CAPs) continue to seek authority in Nebraska. Thus far, TCG of Omaha, a subsidiary of Teleport Communications Group and MFS Intelenet of Nebraska, a wholly-owned subsidiary of MFS Communications Company, have sought and obtained certification to provide private line service in Nebraska. CAPs presently hold authority in several states and are expanding their presence annually. At this time, the regions where CAPs provide service are predominantly metropolitan areas with concentrated populations and strong economic activity.

No applications are pending to provide local service in Nebraska at this time. However, the topic of implementing local competition is being intensely debated nationwide. The Commission, on its own motion, opened a docket (C-1128), to examine local competition in Nebraska. Questions were presented to local and long distance companies certifificated in Nebraska, the cable television industry, as well as the public, with comments due August 1, 1995. The Commission is currently in the process of reviewing filed comments and researching how other states have reacted to local competition.

Opponents of local competition warn that the universal service subsidy which currently exists will be threatened if competitors are allowed to enter the local market. Many telephone companies rely on universal service funding to offer affordable telephone service to their subscribers. Therefore, the Commission opened a second investigative docket (C-1176), to study the need for administering a state universal service fund. Comments were also due August 1, 1995. At this time, the Commission is reviewing both issues and plans to conduct statewide hearings to allow the public the opportunity to comment further on such significant changes.

2. US West Service Complaints

During 1994, the Commission received an overwhelming number of complaints regarding held-orders and delayed repairs from subscribers in the US West territory. The Commission responded to this problem by opening a docket (C-1098), to monitor the service quality of US West. Pursuant to an Order entered by the Commission on August 18, 1994, US West has submitted monthly reports regarding its repairs, held-orders and service quality.

The other thirteen states where US West operates have also experienced similar service problems. The Regional Oversight Committee (ROC), composed of regulators from all fourteen US West states, has met to determine what level of service standards should be expected. The Nebraska PSC has taken an integral role in this task, as our state already has established service standards that all telephone companies must meet.

It appears US West has generally improved its operations, not only in Nebraska, but in other states as well. The number of service complaints has decreased from one year ago; however, the docket remains open for further study and review.

Central Office Data

The condition and type of equipment that telephone companies utilize in their central offices are essential to the provision of quality telephone service. Therefore, the Commission has actively urged all telephone companies to upgrade their switches to digital technology. These more advanced switches allow customer features such as call waiting, call forwarding, equal access and caller I.D.

The following table shows the switching equipment projected to be in use in Nebraska as of December 31, 1995. As can be seen, 94.9% of all switches will be electronic or digital. These types of switches serve over 99% of the access lines in the state. In 1992, only 77% percent of the state's access lines were digital or electronic. Twenty-four switches remain in operation that use step and cross-bar technology. Last year, 38 such switches were being utilized.

4. Toll-Route Diversity

During the latter part of 1994, Nebraska subscribers experienced several widespread telephone outages due to fiber-optic cable cuts. Widespread outages occurred on October 25 near Shelton; October 27 near Schuyler; December 12 in Kearney and December 14, again near Schuyler. During 1995, similar outages have occurred in smaller, isolated areas. In

each incident, customers lost voice, data and video services for several hours.

The Commission received several informal complaints from individuals, businesses, 911 emergency centers, and law enforcement officials following the cable cuts. A formal complaint was filed by the State of Nebraska, Division of Communications against US West for its failure to adequately provide redundancy in the 308 LATA. Additional information regarding this formal complaint appears in Part I, page 4.

On its own motion, on December 16, 1994, the Commission opened a docket (C-1140) to review toll-route diversity in Nebraska and to solicit comments from the telecommunications industry regarding what actions have been taken to improve toll-route diversity, particularly in the 308 LATA. Numerous comments were filed. The Commission is in the process of formulating a plan to bring western Nebraska the same level of redundancy presently enjoyed in the 402 LATA's. The docket remains open.

5. Equal Access

"Equal access" means that a customer can choose which long distance carrier will route and bill the subscriber's toll calls. In equal access exchanges, the subscriber will automatically reach his or her chosen inter-LATA long distance carrier when he or she dials 1+ the called party's number. If equal access is not available, customers are not able to choose long distance providers, thus, the long distance carrier available in the exchange is AT&T. To reach other long distance companies, the customer must dial 800 numbers or use calling cards.

Nebraska has over 130 certificated long distance companies; therefore, the opportunity exists for "slamming", the unauthorized change of a customer from one long distance company to another. Some customers do not realize they are changing their long distance service when they enroll in promotions, sweepstakes or endorse checks from telephone carriers. The Commission continues to assist consumers whose long distance service is switched, to reverse the change and to obtain credit for customers who might have been assessed a fee for the change.

Equal access is available to approximately 97% of the state's access lines. This equates to 931,191 access lines. Equal access is not available for intraLATA calls. Nebraska is divided into three regional LATAs; western Nebraska (the 308 LATA), southeast Nebraska (the south 402 LATA) and the Omaha area, (the North 402 LATA). At this time, long distance service can only be carried within each LATA by US West in the North 402 LATA and the 308 LATA, or by LT&T in the South 402 LATA. For example, a person calling Scottsbluff from Kearney

is dialing within the LATA; therefore, the long distance call is carried and billed by US West. The following page shows a map of Nebraska and the LATA boundaries.

Table 8 shows which local exchanges presently have, or will have, equal access by January 1, 1996. The table displays the expected conversion date to equal access, as well as the number of access lines served in each central office.



Extended Area Service (EAS)

Extended Area Service (EAS) allows a customer in one exchange to place and receive calls from another exchange without paying toll charges. The Commission's EAS rules were implemented in 1991 and numerous applications for EAS have been filed since that time.

During the last year, an alternative to an EAS plan was implemented in the Plattsmouth exchange, served by LT&T, for calls made to Omaha, served by US West. The Plattsmouth plan ultimately evolved into an Enhanced Local Calling Area (ELCA) plan for the Plattsmouth residents, meaning they pay reduced per minute rates for calls into Omaha. This plan models a plan developed by LT&T under a Commission investigation into LT&T's EAS offerings.

The Plattsmouth plan was approved by the Commission in June, 1994; however, approval also had to be obtained at the federal level since the calls from Omaha to Plattsmouth crossed the LATA boundary (the Platte River). Judge Harold Green approved the extended area service request from US West and EAS was implemented from Omaha to Plattsmouth effective April 1, 1995.

Currently, several EAS applications are pending before the Commission. Communities in western Nebraska have filed numerous petitions requesting that calls made to nearby exchanges be toll-free. Residents of Bushnell have filed applications to call Kimball toll-free; Potter residents seek to call Dix, Sidney and Kimball toll-free; Dalton residents seek toll-free calls to Sidney and Gurley; residents of Gurley have requested toll-free calls to Dalton and Sidney; and lastly, Big Springs seeks toll-free calling to Ogallala. At the other end of the state, residents of the Louisville / Manley / Cedar Creek exchange have filed an application for EAS to Omaha. The exchange of Beaver Lake / Murray has also filed a similar EAS petition to Omaha. These last petitions request that a plan be implemented similar to that presently offered to subscribers in the Plattsmouth exchange.

The petitions filed by Potter residents for service to Dix and Sidney, as well as the petition filed by Dalton residents for service to Gurley have been dismissed. By Commission rule and regulation, sufficient calls must be made to the petitioned exchange for EAS to be implemented. The traffic studies compiled in these communities did not demonstrate that adequate calls were being made to make a showing of a community of interest to the petitioned exchange.

For the rest of the petitions, the telephone companies are compiling traffic usage studies for the applications or are

preparing potential rates to be charged for EAS at this time. The usage studies must reflect that the requisite number of calls are being made from the exchange to the requested community to show a community of interest. If sufficient traffic is carried, a ballot will be distributed to residents in each community to determine if an interest exists for the rate levels proposed.

As can be seen in the number of applications filed, extended area service remains an extremely important issue to Nebraska residents statewide. This is primarily due to the high toll rates that are assessed for relatively short distance calls. The Commission is responding to these concerns by promptly processing the EAS applications and by holding hearings across the state for people in these communities to voice their opinions about their current service.

The following table shows data from each exchange, displaying the number of exchanges that can be accessed through extended area service.

7. Link-Up Nebraska

The Link-Up Nebraska program was instituted by the Commission in 1988. This program assists low income individuals and families obtain basic telephone service by reducing the installation charges. Eligible participants are allowed to receive a credit up to one-half their initial installation charge up to \$30. Funding for the program is provided by interexchange carriers that have more than .05% of the access lines in the nation. No state funds, nor state tax dollars are used to operate the program. Link-Up is a national program that is available in numerous states. Administration of the program is provided by the National Exchange Carrier Association (NECA) and all operations must comply with FCC rules.

Annually, the Commission collects data from local exchange carriers in Nebraska to monitor the use of Link-Up Nebraska. Steady increases in the usage of the program are shown in the table below:

The Commission has established criteria for individuals and families to qualify for Link-Up assistance. The participant must not be a dependent for federal income tax purposes (unless at least 60 years of age). Furthermore, at least one of the following tests must be met:

- a. Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- b. Aid to the Aged, Blind, or Disabled (AABD)
- c. Aid to Dependent Children (ADC)
- d. Medicaid
- e. Energy Assistance
- f. Food Stamps
- g. Income which falls within the following guidelines:

8. Nebraska Telecommunications Relay System

The Telecommunications Relay System (TRS) was established in January, 1991, using services from Hamilton Telephone Company, located in Aurora, Nebraska. The Relay allows hearing and/or speech impaired individuals to communicate via the telephone with the hearing community. Communications Assistants (CA's) at the relay center in Aurora transmit conversations between users of text telephones (TT's) and persons who use standard telephones. The CA reads typewritten communications from the hearing-impaired person to the receiving party and relays written responses back over the TT to the hearing impaired.

The relay is funded through a surcharge which is placed on all access lines, including cellular lines. The surcharge was originally set at \$.07 in 1991. In 1992, it was raised to \$.08. Usage of the relay steadily increased; therefore, the Commission increased the surcharge to \$.10 for 1993 and 1994. Beginning July, 1993, the telephone companies began contributing to the relay fund for interstate calls. Roughly, 15% of

the relay calls are interstate calls resulting in a reduction of the need for support on an intrastate basis. The Commission reviewed the surcharge and lowered the rate to \$.07 in January, 1995. This lesser amount will still permit Hamilton to provide quality services to the hearing impaired.

During the 1995 Legislative Session, the Nebraska Commission on the Hearing Impaired (NCHI) and the Public Service Commission jointly worked on legislation to permit low-income hearing impaired individuals to obtain specialized telecommunications equipment at a reduced rate or free of charge. The program was ultimately approved by the Legislature and signed into law by the Governor. It will enable low-income citizens to obtain telecommunications equipment, such as text telephones and amplifiers, so they can utilize the telephone networks. Funding for the program will be provided from the relay surcharge, but, by law, may not exceed the expenditures generated by one cent of the surcharge per month.

At this time, NCHI and the Commission have been meeting with the Relay Advisory Board, as well as the NCHI Board to draft rules and regulations to initiate this program.

9. Omaha Broadband Deployment

US West has been actively developing a new broadband project in Omaha, Nebraska, that would provide multi-media capabilities. Similar projects implemented by US West in other states have now been put on hold to determine whether this technology will be feasible. The broadband will provide subscribers with cleaner transmission and self healing/self-diagnostic features.

The Federal Communications Commission approved construction of the Omaha broadband project in December, 1993. Construction began in April, 1994, and will cost US West in excess of \$60 million. The estimated cost per subscriber is from \$1,400 to \$1,800. The project will serve customers west of Interstate 680 in Omaha.

10. US West Sale of Exchanges

In June, 1995, US West released information offering the sale of 28 US West exchanges, serving 32 communities in Nebraska. The following communities will be affected by the sale:

A proposed agreement provides for the transfer of the exchanges to a new consortium formed by Tritech Communications. HunTel Systems, Inc. of Blair will perform the operating functions of the company.

The major partners of Tritech Communications are Hickory Tech Corporation and Alpine Communications, L.C. Hickory Tech owns Mankato Citizens Telephone Company and Mid-Communications, Inc., a billing company, in Minnesota. Further, Hickory Tech provides service to the Amana Colonies Telephone Company in Iowa. Alpine Communications is owned by a group of independent telephone companies and cable television executives serving Iowa subscribers.

An application requesting approval of the transfer is expected to be filed in 1995 and it is anticipated that the Commission will solicit public comment on this important matter

from the affected communities through a series of public hearings.

11. 911 Information

The Legislature established guidelines for the implementation of a 911 service surcharge in 1990. This 911 service enables users to report an emergency to a public safety answer point (PSAP), such as a sheriff's office or a centralized emergency answering service. Local governing bodies may assess up to 50 cents per telephone access line to fund the 911 system. If the county does not contain a city of the metropolitan class (population 300,000+), the governing body may impose an additional amount, not to exceed 50 cents per month (\$1.00 total).

One problem inherent with this system is that some customers reside outside an established 911 service area, yet are assessed a surcharge by the local governing body. To remedy such circumstances, agreements have been negotiated with individuals at the local level to serve these households with emergency service.

Another issue that surfaced in 1994 by PSAP's was what constituted permissible expenditures of 911 funds. State statutes provide that funds shall be used for the purchase, installation, maintenance and operation of telecommunications equipment and telecommunications-related services required for the provision of 911 service. Several PSAP's were interested in adding computers to emergency vehicles and offering pagers for emergency employees in order to more efficiently dispatch services.

The Commission drafted a request to the Attorney General to determine how the PSAP's were permitted to use 911 funds. The opinion explained that funds could be used to receive 911 service calls and to also dispatch emergency services. The Attorney General's response was distributed to all county attorneys, sheriffs and emergency managers.

In 1993, the Legislature passed LB 305, which required each telephone company to report to the Commission for each of its exchanges the following information:

- (1) whether 911 service or E-911 service is provided;
- (2) the amount of the 911 surcharge;
- (3) the location of the answering point;
- (4) whether the governing body belongs to an inter-local agreement with another governing body, and if so, the name of the other governing body; and,
- (5) the amount of revenue collected by the surcharge.

This information is provided in the following table.

12. LB 286 / Personal Property Tax Refunds

In 1992, the Commission opened docket (C-931), to obtain disposition plans from the telecommunications companies operating in Nebraska due to a tax law change that resulted in a reduction in taxation and generated excess revenues for the companies during the previous years. A corresponding docket, C-992, was opened in 1993 for similar purposes, to distribute excess revenues generated from tax law changes.

All 36 local carriers have gained Commission approval of their proposed disposition plans. Projects ranging from economic development contributions to improved telecommunications services, such as frame relay deployment, Internet, enhanced 911, and projects for educational systems have been instituted pursuant to C-931 and C-992.

Interexchange carriers were also included in C-931 and C-992. The plans negotiated with the IXC's for distribution emulate the projects embarked upon by the local exchange carriers. Only AT&T and LDDS Metromedia Communications have not completed their disposition of excess revenue. Both companies are presently engaging in negotiations with the Commission to comply with the spirit of the legislation.

13. REA State Modernization Plan

The Rural Electrification Administration (REA) published an interim rule to incorporate changes to telephone loan policies as required by the Rural Electrification Loan Restructuring Act of 1992. This Act called for restructuring the present telephone loan program. Many of Nebraska's local independent telephone companies rely on REA funding for financial support due to the extremely low interest rates that are assessed. Therefore, the new policies of the loan program are of great importance to many Nebraska carriers.

Pursuant to the Restructuring Act, all states must provide the REA with a State Telecommunications Modernization Plan. The Modernization Plan is a proposal that explains what the state's telecommunications carriers should offer or provide to its subscribers in order to improve the state's public switched network. REA, as required by the Restructuring Act, will not approve any loans in states that do not have such a plan.

Initially, REA required that the Modernization Plan apply to both borrowers and non-borrowers. However, due to an over-whelming number of responses and concerns regarding this requirement, REA subsequently revised the guidelines to permit state utility commissions to merely encourage applicability to all providers. Plans omitting non-borrowers will, therefore, not preclude REA approval.

The Nebraska Modernization Plan is being formulated and a series of open meetings may be held across the state in order to allow citizens the opportunity to express their telecommunications needs and concerns.

Review of the Level of Rates of Local Exchange and Interexchange Companies

This section of the report discusses local rate changes during the period of July 1, 1994, to June 30, 1995, as well as local rate levels, the financial status of local companies, long distance rates and the interexchange carriers operating in Nebraska.

1. Basic Local Rate Changes

Pursuant to LB 835, local companies are allowed to increase their basic local rates up to 10% per year, subject to a petition process. Under this provision, unless protests are received by a certain percentage of customers, the rate may go into effect without Commission action. Any increases above 10% per year are reviewed by the Commission.

Another provision of the law allows telephone companies serving less than 5,000 access lines to implement a 30% annual increase subject to a petition process by its customers. One increase in basic local rates took place during the last year. Glenwood Telephone Company increased its residential rates in the Funk exchange from \$10.00 to \$11.00. Business rates increased from \$13.50 to \$15.00 monthly. The residential rate in all of its other exchanges went from \$8.00 to \$9.00 and business rates increased from \$12.00 to \$13.50. Since customers did not petition the Commission to review these proposals, the rates went into effect October 1, 1994. The following table lists basic local rate changes implemented by local exchange carriers over the last ten (10) years.

Basic local rates range from \$4.00 to \$15.00 for 1-party residential service and from \$6.25 to \$39.00 for 1-party business service. Several of these local rates have been tariffed for several years, with the oldest current local rate being set in 1959.

The vast differences in the pricing of similar service can be explained as the companies receive varying rates of return, experience various operational costs and have differing populations. Another major component hinges on the telephone company's ability to access subsidies. One leading subsidy program established for telecommunications companies is the Universal Service Fund (USF). This program is discussed in further detail in the following section.

In the following table displaying local rates, keep in mind that if an exchange has extended area service (EAS), the rates for this expanded service are included in the local rate. Further, some telephone companies incorporate into the

local rate touch tone service, while others charge an additional monthly fee for such service.

2. Universal Service Fund

The Universal Service Fund was established by the Federal Communications Commission in 1986 and is designed to maintain local service rates at affordable levels. The goal of the USF is to achieve a 100% penetration rate for telephone service nationwide. In Nebraska, over 96% of households subscribe to local telephone service.

The USF is funded through payments made by interexchange carriers that have at least .05% of the nation's presubscribed lines. Initially, only AT&T funded this program; however, due to the growth of several long distance companies, the program is now financed by 28 different interexchange carriers. As of July, 1995, the interexchange carriers paid \$.50 per access line, per month, to fund the USF.

To receive USF assistance, a telephone company must possess operating costs higher than 115% of the nationwide average. This fund is geared to help companies located in sparsely populated rural areas provide telephone service at a cost comparable to that assessed to citizens in metropolitan cities. The following table shows that 29 of the 42 companies serving Nebraska customers participate in this program and collaboratively receive \$5.1 million in assistance.

Due to the strong growth of the program in recent years, the Federal Communications Commission has imposed a cap on the fund in order to study this issue. Further, federal legislation is pending that may revise the Universal Service Fund. It remains to be seen what changes, if any, Congress and the FCC enact. As mentioned before, the Nebraska Commission has opened a docket to determine the feasibility and practicality of establishing its own universal service program to ensure citizens statewide are able to receive affordable telephone service.

3. Commission Audits

Since last year's report, the Commission has completed its audit of US West Communications and is currently auditing Rock County Telephone and GTE.

US West Communications is the largest local exchange carrier in the state and serves more than 54% of Nebraska's access lines. Reports filed by US West indicated that as of December 31, 1992, the company's earned rate of return on an intrastate basis was 10.35%. After reviewing the records of US West, the Commission offered several adjustments to its financial statements which resulted in an intrastate net operating income of \$56,408,059, yielding an intrastate rate earned rate of return of 12.21%.

During the review, concerns were expressed regarding US West's inability to provide detailed information regarding 1992 access charges. Access charges represent approximately 26% of combined operating revenues and 10% of intrastate operating revenues for US West. A test of the 1992 intrastate revenue proved to be inconclusive. Sufficient information pertaining to current access charge rates was provided and is sufficient to conclude that current access charge rates appear to be consistent with those on file as of December 31, 1994.

The GTE audit is being conducted in conjunction with Commission staff members from the states of Alabama, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Arkansas, Missouri and the Federal Communications Commission. This multi-state effort provides an excellent opportunity for our state to audit such a large company. All expenses for the auditors are being reimbursed by GTE.

4. Financial Statistics

All local exchange companies file annual reports with the Commission. Selected information from the 1994 reports is included in the following pages. Access lines for the industry continued to grow at a rate of 4% from 1993 to 1994. GTE showed the highest growth with 7.8%. Lincoln Telephone's access line growth was 6.5%, while US West showed a 3% growth. The table below reflects the investment levels of gross plant in service during the period:



5. Long Distance Telephone Rates

Long distance service within Nebraska is defined as either intraLATA or interLATA service. The intraLATA calling is carried and billed by either US West or Lincoln Telephone Company. The interLATA calling is provided by AT&T, Sprint, MCI, and a host of other long distance companies. In the last published report, our staff compared US West's toll rates to those offered by US West in South Dakota, Iowa, Colorado, and Kansas (served by Southwestern Bell Telephone). That comparison showed that Nebraska ranked the highest or the second highest in every mileage band sampled and each rate period with two exceptions.

A review of those same states' rates in 1995 reveals that no changes have taken place; thus, the ranking for US West has not changed. US West Nebraska rates range anywhere from 8% to 38% above the lowest rates found in the five state comparison for a five minute call. The difference is particularly higher in Nebraska for calls made under 25 miles. Customers in Iowa and Colorado seem to be the beneficiaries of the cheapest US West rates.

Our comparison this year includes an additional category -- AT&T rates filed in the states of South Dakota, Iowa, Colorado, Kansas and Nebraska. All rates are current as of July 10, 1995. In Nebraska, the rates were increased by AT&T effective July 3, 1995. (A previous rate increase was implemented by AT&T in August, 1994.)

The following table shows the range of rates filed by AT&T in the five states listed above, the Nebraska rate for the call, and the state having the lowest and highest rate for the call. We note that AT&T Nebraska rates range from 35% to 83% higher than the lowest rates found in the five state survey.

6. Access Charges

The interexchange companies, AT&T, MCI and Sprint, pay access charges to the local exchange carriers for utilization of the local switch to provide long distance service to subscribers. These charges were established in 1987 and are designed to allow the local companies the opportunity to recover the cost they encounter in connecting toll calls through their offices. Many large local exchange companies have reduced access charges in recent years, including US West; however, several small local exchange companies have maintained the present access rate or have even raised the rate in order to keep the cost of basic local service at current levels.

Across the nation, local exchange companies are decreasing access rates, and the cost of providing interconnection for interexchange carriers has continually declined since 1987. AT&T has urged Nebraska telephone companies to follow this trend and to reduce their access charges. However, few companies have responded to this request. Due to the large amount of revenue that these charges generate, it is unlikely that the companies will follow this request. Unfortunately for consumers, the present cost of access rates leads to extremely high rates for intrastate toll calls.

PART IV



Recommendations and Recent Legislative Action

1. Summary of 1995 Legislative Session

During 1995, the Legislature gave the Commission the authority to administratively fine telecommunications carriers operating in Nebraska without a certificate of authority and to fine authorized carriers that do not timely remit an annual report to the Commission, as required by statute.

Uncertificated interexchange carriers pose problems for consumers, as well as the Commission. If the consumer has a difficult time obtaining assistance, without a contact person, address or phone number, the Commission must spend a great deal of time resolving such consumer complaints.

The Commission is investigating a number of interexchange carriers operating in Nebraska without proper authority and has been in contact with numerous companies explaining the certification process. In 1995 alone, the Commission has notified over 30 companies they are operating in Nebraska without a certificate, and therefore, need to become certificated. The ability to fine such companies for failing to comply with state statutes, as well as the Commission's Rules and Regulations, will be extremely helpful.

By statute, all telecommunication companies are to submit an annual report to the Commission by April 30th of each year. During 1994, 69 interexchange carriers were certificated in Nebraska and 45 failed to file the requested reports. In 1995, that number increased. The ability to fine companies will encourage compliance with the law and will also be a more efficient means for the Commission to sanction violators.

Also during the 1995 session, the Commission requested authority to regulate the quality of service furnished by cable television (LB 840) and cellular telephone providers (LB 23). Although these proposals did not become law, the convergence taking place in this industry would dictate that these segments of the telecommunications market should become regulated in the public interest on an even playing field.

2. Proposals for the 1996 Legislative Session

Recommendations may be submitted to the Legislature for the 1996 Session regarding the issue of local competition. Any such proposals will certainly include participation from the public, as well as the industry. Furthermore, the research material gathered by the Commission on the issue of local competition will be shared with the Legislature for joint collaboration. Lastly, federal legislation proposed and enacted during

the remainder of 1995 may require further recommendatios for legislative action.
