Review of the Quality of Telecommunications Service Provided to Nebraska Citizens

1. Telephone Complaints

Customers generally contact the Public Service Commission when their local telephone company does not resolve their complaints satisfactorily. Most complaints are handled informally, where the Commission contacts the respective telephone company and acts as a mediator for the customer. Generally, informal complaints are resolved to the customer's satisfaction; however, a customer may file a formal complaint if a resolution cannot be obtained. Formal complaints are brought before the Commissioners for a hearing. During 1995-96, four formal complaints were filed. A full discussion of the formal complaints is provided later in this section.

The Communications Department filed three departmental complaints during the year. Departmental complaints are filed against a telephone company if it does not follow Nebraska statutes or the Commission's Rules and Regulations. Two department complaints concerned several companies which failed to file annual reports with the Commission. The other departmental complaint concerned an interexchange carrier (IXC) that was operating in Nebraska illegally.

A. Number of Complaints

The following table shows the total number of complaints filed this year and divides the complaints between local exchange carriers (LECs) and interexchange carriers (IXCs). Similar to last year, a majority of the informal complaints were filed against LECs. The complaints catalogued in the "other" category include complaints filed against cellular and cable television providers. Overall, the number of complaints doubled from just two years ago.

During the past year, 753 informal complaints were handled by the Commission. This represents an increase of nearly 26% over the previous year. In an attempt to identify those areas where complaints are increasing, the Commission changed its complaint recording system in 1995 to reflect complaint categories, as reflected in the following table.

The miscellaneous complaint category includes harassing calls, requests to establish various optional features, such as Caller I.D., requests for extended area service (EAS) and equal access. The Commission has also seen a substantial increase in the number of complaints concerning telemarketing practices. When such a complaint is received, the Commission attempts to remove the customer's number from the telemarketing contact list. The Commission is also fielding more and more calls concerning Internet access and availability.

Billing complaints continue with private pay phone providers assessing costly surcharges. However, this category also includes billing errors and deposit requests imposed by both LECs and IXC's.

The most noticeable increase in complaints was in the service area. Service quality complaints increased by 91.4% from last year. Numerous complaints were filed against US West for cable not being buried, held orders (not being able to receive telephone service within thirty (30) days) and delays in repairs.

B. Local Exchange Carriers (LECs)

There are 42 LECs in Nebraska (including cooperative telephone companies). US West is the largest LEC in Nebraska with 517,410 access lines, while Sodtoun Telephone Company has 87 access lines.

The following table shows the LEC complaints by company. As one would expect, the largest number of complaints involved the two largest LECs in Nebraska, US West Communications and Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Company (now Aliant).

C. Formal Complaints

From July 1, 1995 to June 30, 1996, four formal complaints were filed with the Commission. Unlike past years, the majority of formal complaints were not filed by individual customers, but by telephone service providers.

Once a formal complaint is filed, the Commission rules allow the respondent a period of time in which to attempt to resolve the issue before further action is taken. One of the formal complaints was resolved in this fashion. On July 7, 1995, Curtis L. Bader filed a formal complaint against Blair Telephone Company alleging excessive charges were billed by the Blair Telephone Company to repair a cable cut. Before the hearing took place, the parties settled upon a charge that was agreeable to them both.

In February, 1996, US West filed to withdraw the offering of Centrex Plus to all new customers. Centrex Plus provides business telephone customers with direct inward and outward dialing with numerous features. Centrex is used by large businesses, state government and the University of Nebraska. Existing customers were grandfathered for nine (9) years and can expand their existing service during that period. However, new customers are not able to receive Centrex. Formal Complaints were filed by AT&T Communications, MCI Telecommunications and McLeod Telemanagement against the withdrawal.

The complainants allege that US West's withdrawal of Centrex Plus was an unfair practice and illegal under federal and state law and the Commission's Rules and Regulations. Since the issues were the same in all three formal complaints, the complaints were consolidated into one hearing. On May 30, 1996, the Commission held its hearing. Briefs were submitted June 28, 1996, and closing arguments were made July 9, 1996. An order is expected to be issued in the near future.

D. Interexchange Carriers (IXCs)

The Commission received more complaints in 1995-96 that dealt with IXCs (commonly known as long distance carriers) than in the previous year. Last year, the Commission had 224 complaints filed against IXCs, this year the number rose to 238. In addition, the number of IXCs that have been granted authority to operate in Nebraska has increased. Nebraska now has 187 long distance carriers operating in Nebraska, compared to last year's number of 133.

One of the common complaints lodged by consumers concerns "slamming," the unauthorized switching of a customer's long distance carrier. In an attempt to identify companies who practice slamming, the Commission began tracking slamming complaints. In the first year of cataloging such complaints, the Commission received 66 unauthorized switches of long distance carriers. Customers can be sure they have the long distance carrier of their choice by dialing the toll-free telephone number (700) 555-4141.

IXCs were also criticized for using aggressive marketing techniques. When the Commission receives a complaint regarding a particular carrier's marketing technique, the staff immediately contacts the company and removes the customer's name, telephone number and address from its call list.

Complaints concerning 800/900 pay-per-call services decreased during 1995-96, with the Commission receiving only fifteen (15) such complaints. The previous year, the Commission received seventy-eight (78) such complaints. Customers seem to be more aware of the excessive charges associated with these calls.

2. Consumer Toll-Free Hotline

In 1988, the Commission introduced an intrastate toll-free consumer hotline. The hotline has been heavily used and has enabled citizens of all income levels to call the Commission for assistance free of charge. A quarterly newsletter was initiated in 1995, informing county officials, civic organizations and state agencies of the Commission's operations and its toll-free telephone number.

3. Service Testing

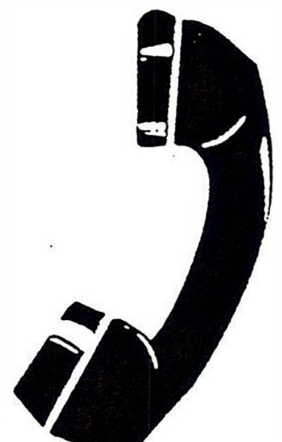
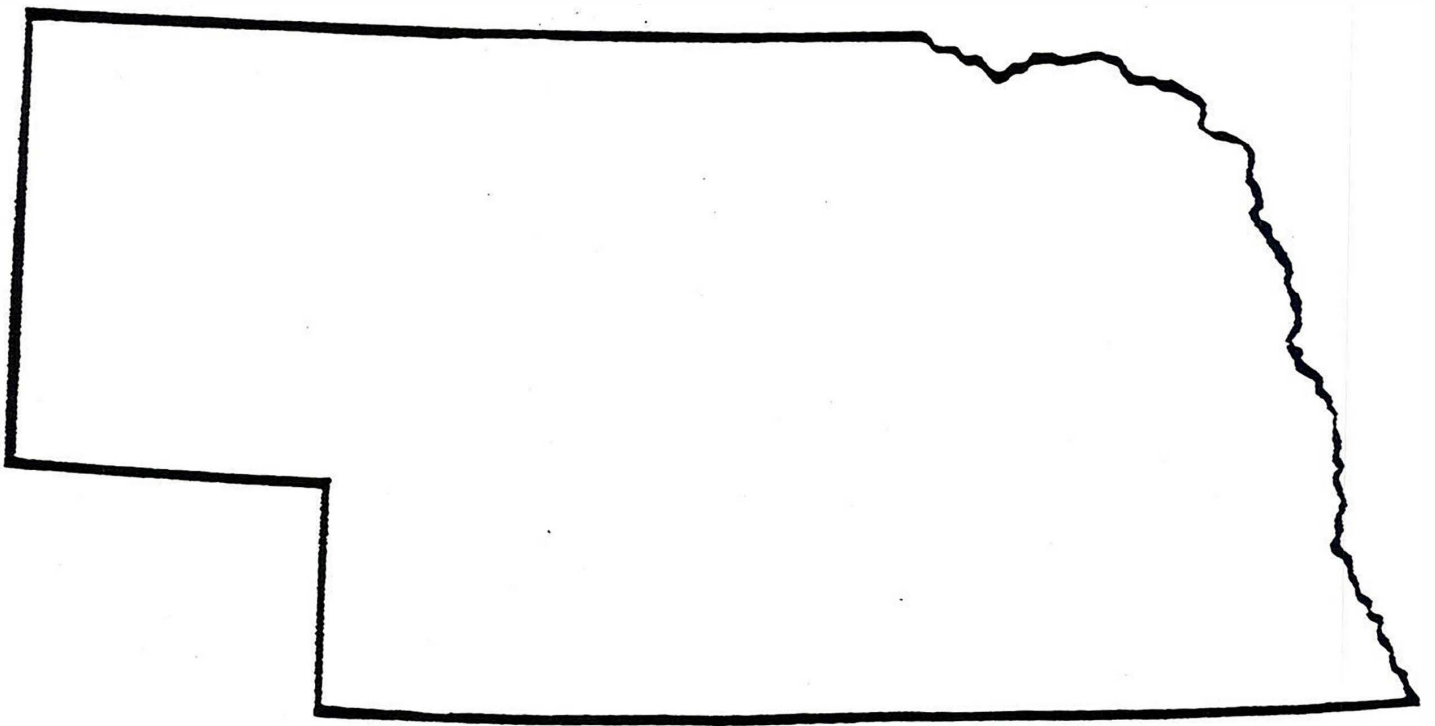
The Commission is dedicated to ensuring Nebraskans are receiving adequate telecommunications service. The Commission has continued to emphasize the importance of testing every telephone company central office. During 1995-96, the Commission made 475,768 test calls. Test calls were made in 262 exchanges served by 26 different LECs.

LECs continue to replace the older step-by-step, crossbar, and electronic switches with digital equipment. In fact, many LECs are now replacing their existing digital equipment with newer, more advanced digital switches. With digital equipment, LECs are able to increase the service options available to customers. At the end of 1995, 94.1% of Nebraska switches were digital.

The Commission's technical staff strives to ensure that all certificated carriers provide quality telecommunications service in compliance with its rules. On-site testing provides the Commission with a hands-on evaluation of company facilities and offers consumers technical assistance from an independent source. The technician has also visited several homes and businesses across the state during the past year to assist the Commission in resolving service complaints.

Review of the Availability of Diverse and Affordable Telecommunications Services to the People of Nebraska

1. Federal Changes

The Federal Telecommunication Act of 1996 (the Act) signed into law on February 8, 1996, provides redirection for telecommunications policy for the 21st century. Decades of regulatory protection for local telephone service providers has ended. The new law mandates wide-ranging changes within the information, cable TV, media and telecommunications markets in the United States. The Act mandates that the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and the Nebraska Public Service Commission work together in formulating the policies and rules necessary to introduce competition in the local market.

A. Local Competition

Since the passage of the Act, the Commission has received applications requesting local authority from AT&T, Teleport Communications Group (TCG), Cox Cable Omaha, Excel Communications, Dial and Save of Nebraska, Firstel and Sprint. Hearings have and will continue to be held in order to resolve local competition issues, including certification of competitive local providers.

The first hearing concerning an application for local competition was held on June 13, 1996, and concerned AT&T's application to become a local exchange provider in the state of Nebraska. The hearing lasted two days and twenty-eight parties intervened in the proceeding. Testimony was taken from six witnesses representing AT&T, US West, the Nebraska Telephone Association (NTA) and the Nebraska Independent Telephone Association (NITA). Final briefs were filed July 30, 1996 and closing arguments were heard August 19, 1996. The Commission will enter an order in the near future.

B. Arbitration/Mediation Responsibilities

Under the Act, a company wanting to compete with a LEC may ask for the mediation of interconnection terms between the two companies. Either company has the ability to petition the Commission for mediation after negotiations begin. Either party may also ask for arbitration 135 days after the request for negotiation is made. The Commission has formulated a policy statement explaining how the Commission will handle mediation and arbitration requests. Interested parties submitted comments to the Commission before the policy was adopted.

The Commission has received arbitration requests by TCG for US West, by AT&T for both US West and GTE, by Western Wireless for both US West and GTE and by Sprint for US West. The Act states that the entire process of finalizing the terms of the interconnection

agreement must be completed within nine (9) months after a company asks to negotiate. Currently, the arbitrator is required to finalize TCG's terms with US West by November 9, 1996 and has until December 2, 1996, to resolve AT&T and US West's terms of interconnection. By December 12, 1996, the arbitrator must finalize AT&T and GTE's interconnection agreement. The other petitions have been filed recently.

Inevitably, the Commission will be receiving more requests for arbitration and mediation. Numerous competitive local exchange carriers (CLECs) have shown an interest in competing with the incumbent LECs. As these initial CLEC applications and interconnection agreements are approved, we anticipate additional applications for certificates of authority will be filed.

C. Rural Telephone Company Exemptions

The Act establishes safeguards for high cost areas served by rural telephone companies. Provisions of the Act state rural telephone companies are exempt from local competition until the rural company receives a bona fide request for interconnection from a competitor. After the rural company receives a bona fide request, the Commission must determine if the interconnection request is not unduly economically burdensome, is technically feasible and is consistent with universal service requirements of the Act. After reviewing the request, the Commission may permit competition in the company's territory or it may determine that the exemption for the company must remain intact.

D. Disclosure of Current EAS Agreements

During 1996, AT&T and MCI requested the Commission to mandate all LECs to make available their existing interconnection agreements, including extended area service (EAS) agreements. The Act mandates all existing interconnection agreements be filed with the state commission. In July, 1996, the NPSC denied the request pending the FCC rules which were issued in August, 1996. The FCC rules addressed this issue and required all Class A companies to file existing interconnection agreements on or before June 30, 1997 and urges all other LECs to file the same with the state commissions. In July, 1996, the Commission requested interested parties to submit proposed rules regarding local competition by September 30, 1996. The Commission will consider appropriate rule changes in this area after such comments are submitted and reviewed.

2. Central Office Data

The condition and type of equipment that telephone companies utilize in their central offices are essential to the provision of quality telephone service. Therefore, the Commission has actively urged all telephone companies to upgrade their switches to digital technology offering customers more advanced features such as call waiting, call forwarding, equal access and caller I.D.

The following table shows the switching equipment projected to be in use in Nebraska as of December 31, 1996. As can be seen, 95.8% of all switches are electronic or digital serving over 99% of the access lines in the state. In 1992, only 77% of the state's access lines were digital or electronic. Twenty switches remain in operation that use step and cross-bar technology. Last year, twenty-four such switches were being utilized.

3. Outage Reports

Since 1993, the Commission has received numerous complaints regarding telephone service outages. To track outages, on January 1, 1996, the Commission directed the LECs to file Service Outage Reports. In the report, the LEC provides the date and time of the interruption, the geographic area affected, the cause of the outage, if known, and an estimate of the working access lines affected by the outage. Within five days after the outage is repaired, the LEC must submit a final report with the number of customer trouble reports that were received related to the outage and a description of the corrective action taken.

In Nebraska, mother nature will always cause some telephone outages. Furthermore, underground telephone cables can also be damaged by inadvertent construction excavation. The following table summarizes the causes of Nebraska's outages. Many of these outages affected Nebraskans in multiple LEC service areas. Therefore, the total number of outages does not correspond to the number of outages occurring per LEC. Multiple LECs may experience outages when high capacity cables are cut. Fortunately, many calls can be diverted to a second route, circumventing the cable cut. Other outages are caused by telephone equipment that has malfunctioned.

A total of 63 outages were reported between January 1, 1996, and June 30, 1996. The following table summarizes the reports received by the Commission. A total of 43,210 access lines were affected by outages in the six (6) month period.

The Commission is committed to reducing the number of telephone outages and we believe keeping accurate records of outages will better serve the state by identifying the causes of outages.

4. Equal Access

One of the goals of the Commission is to ensure equal access to all Nebraskans. Equal access simply means customers can select the long distance company of their choice. In equal access exchanges, the subscriber will automatically reach his or her chosen interLATA long distance carrier when he or she dials 1+ the called party's number. If equal access is not provided to the customer, the customer will not be able to choose a long distance carrier, but will automatically be serviced by AT&T. To reach other long distance companies, the customer must first dial an access code or use a calling card. Currently, interLATA equal access is available to approximately 98% of the state's access lines. A table later in this report showing extended area service (EAS) data also includes data regarding the status of equal access in each exchange. Listed below are the companies that will not complete the conversion to equal access by January 1, 1997.

5. Link-Up Nebraska

In 1988, the Commission instituted the Link-Up Nebraska program which enables low income individuals and families to obtain basic telephone service by reducing installation charges. Eligible participants are allowed to receive credit up to one-half their initial installation charges not to exceed \$30. The funding for the program is provided by interexchange carriers that have more than .05% of the access lines in the nation. Link-Up is a national program that is available in every state and is administered by the National Exchange Carrier Association (NECA).

Participation in the program has steadily increased, as demonstrated in the following table.

6. Nebraska Telecommunications Relay System

The Nebraska Telecommunications Relay System allows hearing and/or speech impaired individuals to communicate using the telephone network. Communications Assistants (CA's) are stationed at the Aurora relay system center. A CA will transmit written communication from a text telephone to a person using a standard telephone. The person using the standard telephone can speak to the CA, who will type the message to the hearing-impaired individual.

The relay is funded through a monthly surcharge on all access lines, including cellular lines. The original surcharge was set at \$.07 in 1991. In 1992, it was raised to \$.08. Usage of the relay steadily increased; therefore, the Commission increased the surcharge to \$.10 for 1993 and 1994. The Commission reviewed the surcharge and lowered the rate to \$.07 in January,

1995, due to the financial contribution by the National Exchange Carrier Association for interstate calls. The surcharge remained at \$.07 per month for 1996, and has been ordered to remain at \$.07 for 1997.

During the 1995 Legislative Session, the Nebraska Commission for the Hearing Impaired (NCHI) and the Public Service Commission jointly worked on legislation to permit low-income hearing impaired individuals to obtain specialized telecommunications equipment at reduced rates. The program was ultimately approved by the Legislature and signed into law by the Governor. It enables low-income citizens to obtain telecommunications equipment, such as TDDs and amplifiers at discounted prices, so they can communicate with other individuals. Funding for the program is provided from the relay surcharge; but, by law, may not exceed the expenditures generated annually by one cent of the surcharge.

The following table displays the usage statistics generated by the Nebraska Relay System since 1991.

7. Extended Area Service (EAS)

Extended Area Service (EAS) allows a customer in one exchange to place and receive calls from another exchange without paying toll charges. The Commission's EAS rules were implemented in 1991 and numerous applications have been filed since then. Almost all applications are filed by subscribers in small communities.

Since July, 1995, EAS petitions were filed by the following communities:

The Potter to Kimball petition did not meet the Commission's rules regarding the requisite usage from the petitioning exchange to the requested exchange and was therefore dismissed.

The Bushnell to Kimball petition failed to pass when balloted in the community, as more than 50% of the eligible subscribers did not vote in favor of the proposed EAS rates developed by Dalton Telephone Company (Dalton). The EAS rates were \$31.75 per month for residential subscribers and \$36.50 per month for business subscribers. The Gurley to Sidney petition was also dismissed. The EAS rates developed by Dalton for Gurley customers were \$37.07 per month for residential subscribers and \$51.89 per month for business subscribers. Dalton set the EAS additive for residential rates for the Dalton to Sidney petition at \$25.12 per month and \$35.17 for business subscribers, per month. These rates are in addition to the basic local service rate already imposed.

The Big Springs to Ogallala proposed EAS rates were approved by more than 50% of the subscribers and the service is in effect. Therefore, Big Springs customers, served by US West, are now able to reach Ogallala without paying toll charges, but are required to pay an EAS additive of \$1.50 per month for residential lines and \$3.00 per month for business lines.

The Bertrand to Holdrege and the Fremont to Omaha petitions remain pending and ballots are presently being distributed to subscribers to determine their interest in expanding their calling scope.

Petitions were also submitted from the communities of Yutan, Murray (Beaver Lake), Louisville, Cedar Creek and Manley for EAS to Omaha. These petitions resulted in LT&T proposing to offer these customers the full Enhanced Local Calling Area (ELCA) plan allowing them to pay a reduced price per minute for calls into Omaha. The ELCA plans have been approved by the Commission and the customers are waiting for FCC approval so that US West can carry calls across the LATA boundary (the Platte River). Under this plan, calls from Omaha to the petitioning exchanges will not be charged on a per minute basis.

The Kilgore to Cody and the Cody to Valentine petitions were dismissed for failing to meet the usage requirements set forth in Commission Rules. Subsequently, customers in the Cody exchange challenged the accuracy of the traffic study conducted from Cody to Valentine. US West remitted a second traffic study which showed the usage originally reported was incorrect and that indeed, sufficient traffic was carried to proceed. The docket was reopened and proposed rates are currently being developed.

The following table shows, by exchange, (1) extended area service routes, (2) access line data and (3) the availability of equal access.

8. US West Sale of Exchanges

In June, 1995, US West released information offering the sale of 28 US West exchanges, serving 32 communities in Nebraska. The following communities were to be affected by the sale:

The initial proposed agreement provided for the transfer of the exchanges to a new consortium formed by Tritech Communications of Minnesota. However, when that agreement failed, other purchasers were sought.

By joint application filed March 22, 1996, Arapahoe Telephone Company, Great Plains Communications, Inc., Nebraska Central Telephone Company and Northeast Nebraska Telephone Company sought approval for the purchase of the 28 US West exchanges serving 32 communities.

In accordance with the terms of the agreement, US West proposed to sell and transfer control of the exchanges in the following fashion:

- (a) Arapahoe would purchase the Brule, Farnam, Loomis and Overton exchanges;
- (b) Great Plains would purchase the Belgrade, Cedar Rapids, Cody, Crookston, Culbertson, Gordon, Primrose, Rushville, Spalding, Stratton, and Trenton exchanges;
- (c) Nebraska Central would purchase the Ashton, Boelus, Dannebrog, Elba, Litchfield, Mason City, Ravenna, and Rockville exchanges; and
- (d) Northeast Nebraska would purchase the Allen, Bristow, Butte, Decatur, Long Pine, Spencer, Stuart, Waterbury and Winside exchanges.

After holding a public hearing and weighing the effects of the sale, the Commission entered an order authorizing the sale of the exchanges. Subsequent applications were filed by the purchasers for financing of the transaction. Approval is still being sought from the FCC and the sale is anticipated to be complete and take effect January 1, 1997.

9. 911 Information

The Legislature established a 911 service surcharge in 1990. This service enables users to report an emergency to a public safety answering point (PSAP), such as a sheriff's office or a centralized emergency answering center. All cities, except those of the metropolitan class, may assess up to \$1.00 per telephone access line to fund the 911 system. Cities of the metropolitan class (population 300,000+) may impose a fee up to 50 cents.

One problem inherent with this system is that some customers reside outside an established 911 service area, yet are assessed a surcharge by the local governing body on their telephone bill. To remedy such circumstances, agreements have been negotiated between local governments to serve these households with emergency service.

Another issue that surfaced in 1994 was what constituted permissible expenditures of 911 funds. State statutes provide that funds shall be used for the purchase, installation, maintenance and operation of telecommunications equipment and telecommunications-related services required for the provision of 911 service. Several governing bodies were interested in adding computers to emergency vehicles and offering pagers for emergency employees in order to more efficiently dispatch response personnel.

The Commission drafted a request to the Attorney General to determine how the governing bodies were permitted to use 911 funds. The opinion explained that funds could be used to receive 911 service calls and to also dispatch emergency services. The Attorney General's response was distributed to all county attorneys, sheriffs and emergency managers.

In 1993, the Legislature passed LB 305, which required each telephone company to report the following information to the Commission for each of its exchanges:

- (1) whether 911 service or E-911 service is provided;
- (2) the amount of the 911 surcharge;
- (3) the location of the answering point;
- (4) whether the governing body belongs to an inter-local agreement with another governing body, and if so, the name of the other governing body; and,
- (5) the amount of revenue collected by the surcharge.

This information is provided in the following table.

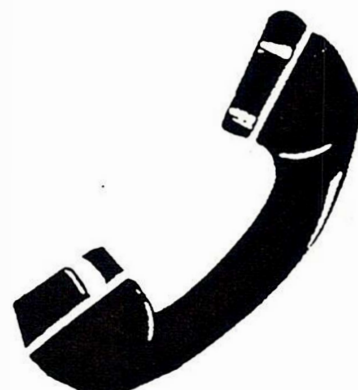
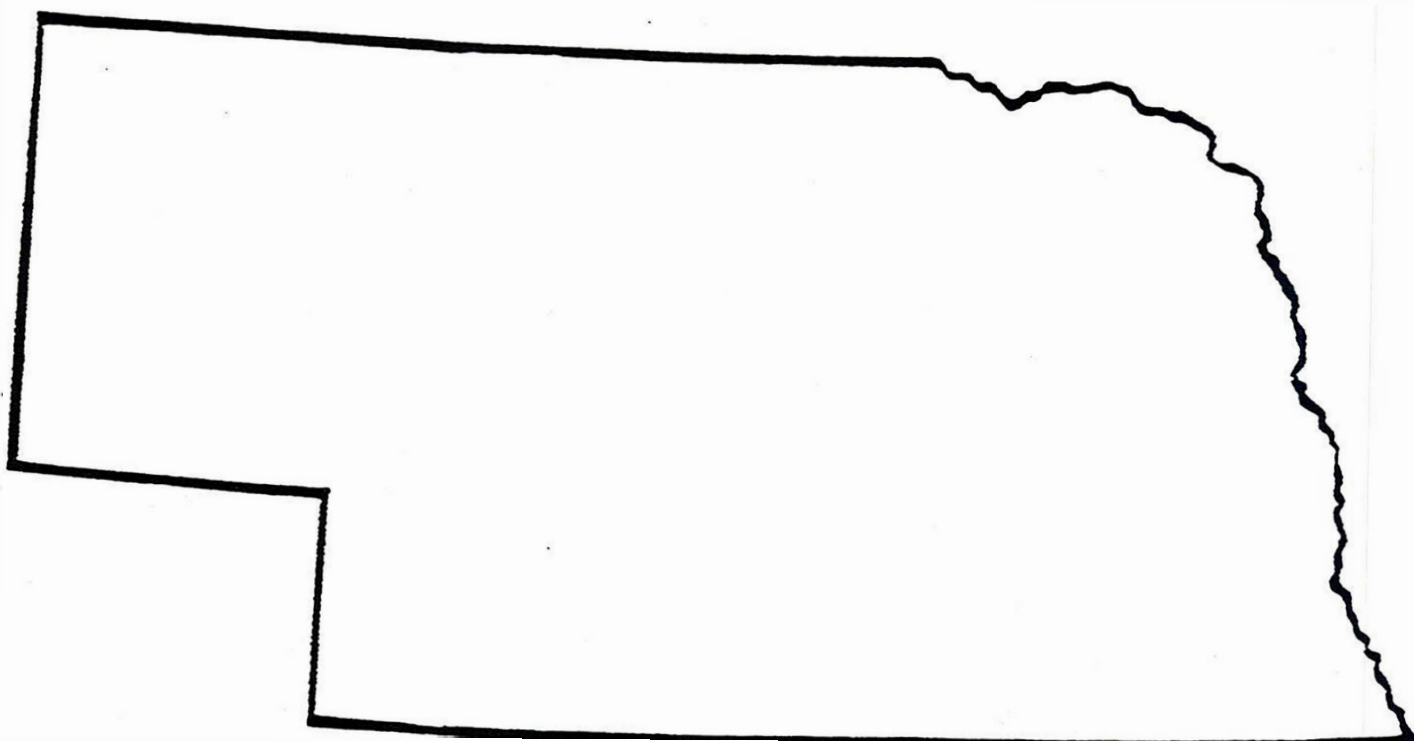

Review of the Level of Rates of Local Exchange and Interexchange Companies

This section of the report discusses local rate changes during the period of July 1, 1995 to June 30, 1996, as well as local rate levels, the financial status of local companies, long distance rates and the interexchange carriers operating in Nebraska.

1. Basic Local Rate Changes

LB 835, which was passed ten years ago, allows companies to increase their basic local rates up to 10% per year, subject to a petition process. Under current statutes, unless protests are received by a certain percentage of customers, the rate will go into effect without Commission action. Any rate increases above 10% per year may be subject to review by the Commission. At the present time, four (4) local rate proposals are pending under the provisions of LB 835.

US West is proposing to increase residential rates as follows:

GTE has filed a notification proposing to raise local rates approximately 9½% for its customers in Nebraska effective November 1, 1996.

Applications for basic local rate increases were filed by the Lincoln Telephone and

Telegraph Company for the Louisville, Cedar Creek, Manley and Murray exchanges. Both applications, C-1282 and C-1283 respectively, were filed in accordance with the Commission's orders implementing Enhanced Local Calling Area (ELCA) plans for the communities. As discussed earlier, Murray, Louisville, Cedar Creek and Manley subscribers petitioned the Commission for Extended Area Service to Omaha during 1995 which would have allowed subscribers to make toll free calls to the Omaha exchange. The petitions were modified to offer Enhanced Local Calling Area (ELCA) plans which enabled subscribers to call Omaha at reduced rates. Customers calling these exchanges from Omaha will be provided with toll-free calling by US West.

The basic local rates for the communities have been approved by the Commission; however, the matter is still pending at the Federal Communications Commission. US West must obtain a waiver from the FCC to carry traffic across the LATA boundary, the Platte River.

The following tables display (1) the change in local service revenue that the five largest companies have experienced in the last five years; (2) the local rate changes implemented for all companies in the last ten years; (3) the current local rates for all companies in Nebraska.

2. Universal Service

The Telecommunications Act of 1996 (the Act), adopted in February, 1996, gives state commissions the responsibility to designate common carriers as "Eligible Telecommunications Carriers" (ETCs) for federal universal service funding (USF). The state commission is required to designate more than one ETC in an area, unless the area is rural and the state commission's public interest finding shows that only one company should have universal service. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will be promulgating rules and regulations to assist the state commission's in determining the guidelines for universal service.

The federal Universal Service Fund was established in 1986 to maintain local service rates at affordable levels. The FCC designed the Fund to achieve a 100% penetration rate for telephone service nationwide. In Nebraska, over 96% of households subscribe to local telephone service. The Fund is being reviewed in light of the Act. The advent of competition at the local level raises new considerations that must be resolved to maintain the high penetration level that we presently enjoy.

The Act requires a Federal/State Joint Board to provide recommendations to the FCC on or before November 8, 1996, and the FCC to promulgate rules by May 8, 1997. The Federal/State Joint Board issued a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) in March, 1996. The Nebraska PSC joined seven other rural state commissions in filing comments and reply comments to the NPRM.

The Nebraska Commission has actively pursued implementing a state Universal Service Fund to ensure that the goals of the Act and Nebraska's statutes are met. A docket was opened in 1995 to study the feasibility and practicality of establishing a state universal service program. To that end, a task force comprised of individuals from various aspects of the industry, as well representatives from library, education and health care institutions is meeting to make recommendations to the Commission on creating a state Universal Service Fund. The task force's preliminary report is scheduled to be submitted to the Commission in December, 1996.

3. Commission Audits

Part of the Commission's ongoing responsibilities include auditing the records of the local telecommunications carriers. During the fiscal year 1995/1996, the Commission audited Curtis Telephone Company, Rock County Telephone Company, K & M Telephone Company and Diller Telephone Company.

A GTE audit is being conducted in conjunction with the states of Alabama, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Arkansas, Missouri and the Federal Communications Commission. This federal/state joint audit provides an excellent opportunity for Nebraska to audit this large company by sharing resources with others. The expenses for the auditors are being covered by GTE and the results of the audit should be released this fall.

4. Financial Statistics

All local exchange companies file annual reports with the Commission. Selected information from the 1995 reports is included in the following pages. In order to encourage customers to add additional lines, companies are promoting teen lines, waivers of one-time charges and waiving the subscriber line charge for an additional business line. Growth has also been a result of the increased use of fax and modem lines. The growth and the need to upgrade and enhance the existing infrastructure has resulted in an increase in plant as shown in the following table.

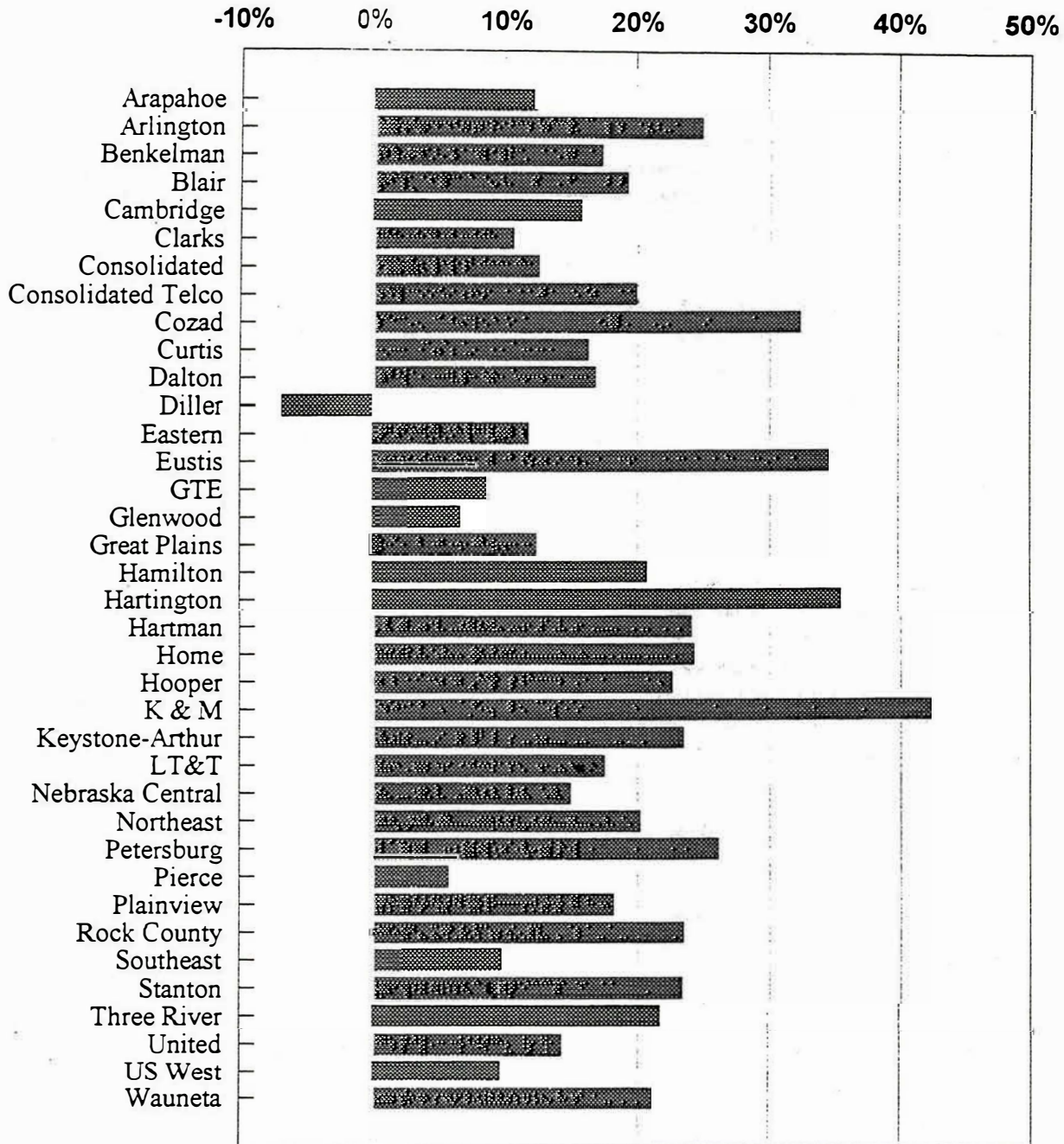

5. Long Distance Telephone Rates / Access Charges

Long distance rates within Nebraska continue to be above the average of neighboring states. During 1995, the Nebraska Telephone Association (NTA) and nineteen of its members filed an application with the Commission, C-1273, for authority to place a \$2.00 monthly subscriber line charge (SLC) on all subscribers' bills and to accordingly reduce access charges by approximately 10 to 15%. The \$2.00 charge was mandatory for all subscribers served by the nineteen telephone companies, except for Great Plains Communications, which opted not to propose a charge for business customers. The remaining telephone companies in Nebraska which were not parties to the application would not impose the \$2.00 SLC, though some stated they would decrease access charges accordingly.

Access charges are the prices long distance companies, such as AT&T and MCI, pay to the local exchange carrier for utilization of the local network to provide long distance services to subscribers. These charges were established in 1987 and are designed to allow the local companies to recover the costs of connecting toll calls through their offices. Some large companies, including US West, have lowered access charges. Many Nebraska telephone companies have access charges much higher than US West and these rates are a large part of the cost of toll, thereby contributing to high intrastate toll rates.

The application filed by the NTA was denied by the Commission on a 3 - 2 vote in May, 1996. The Commission continues to urge local companies to review the present level of access charges.

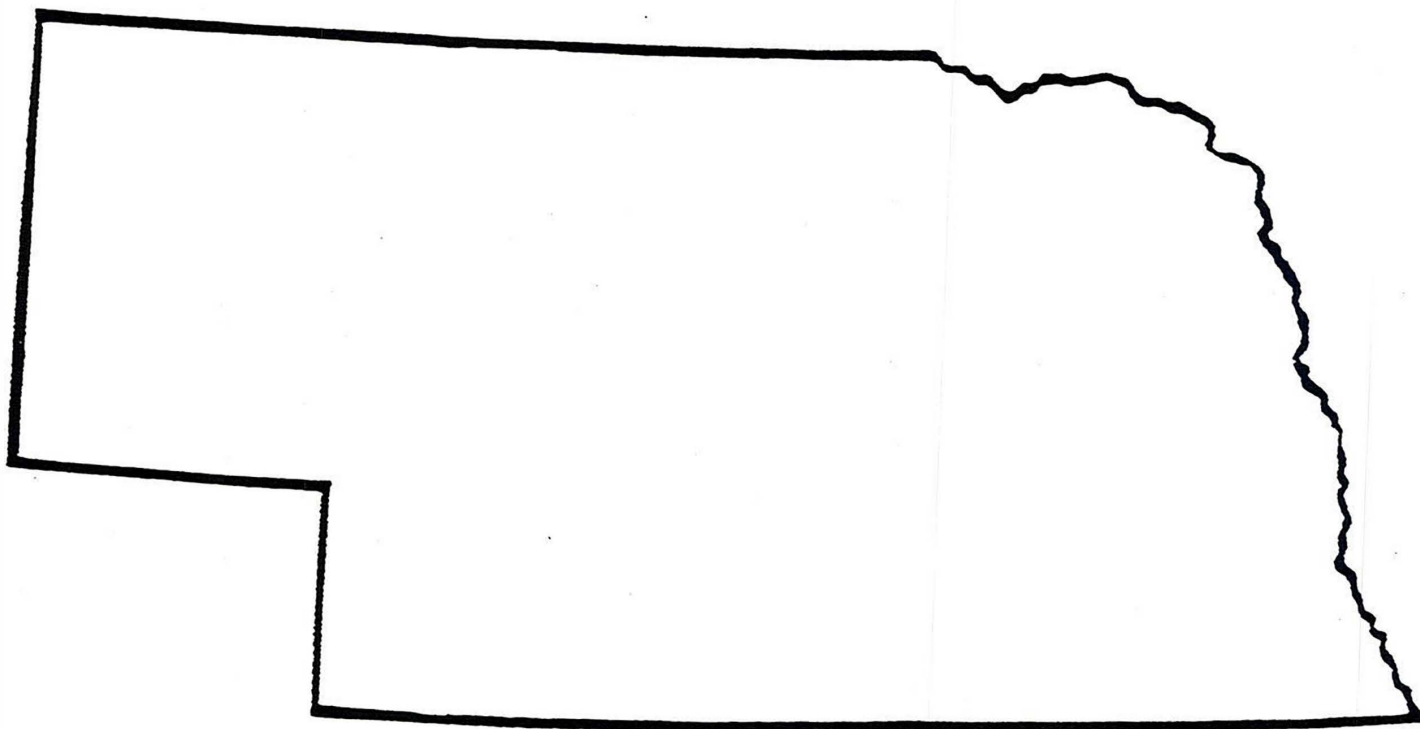

Recommendations for the 1997 Legislative Session

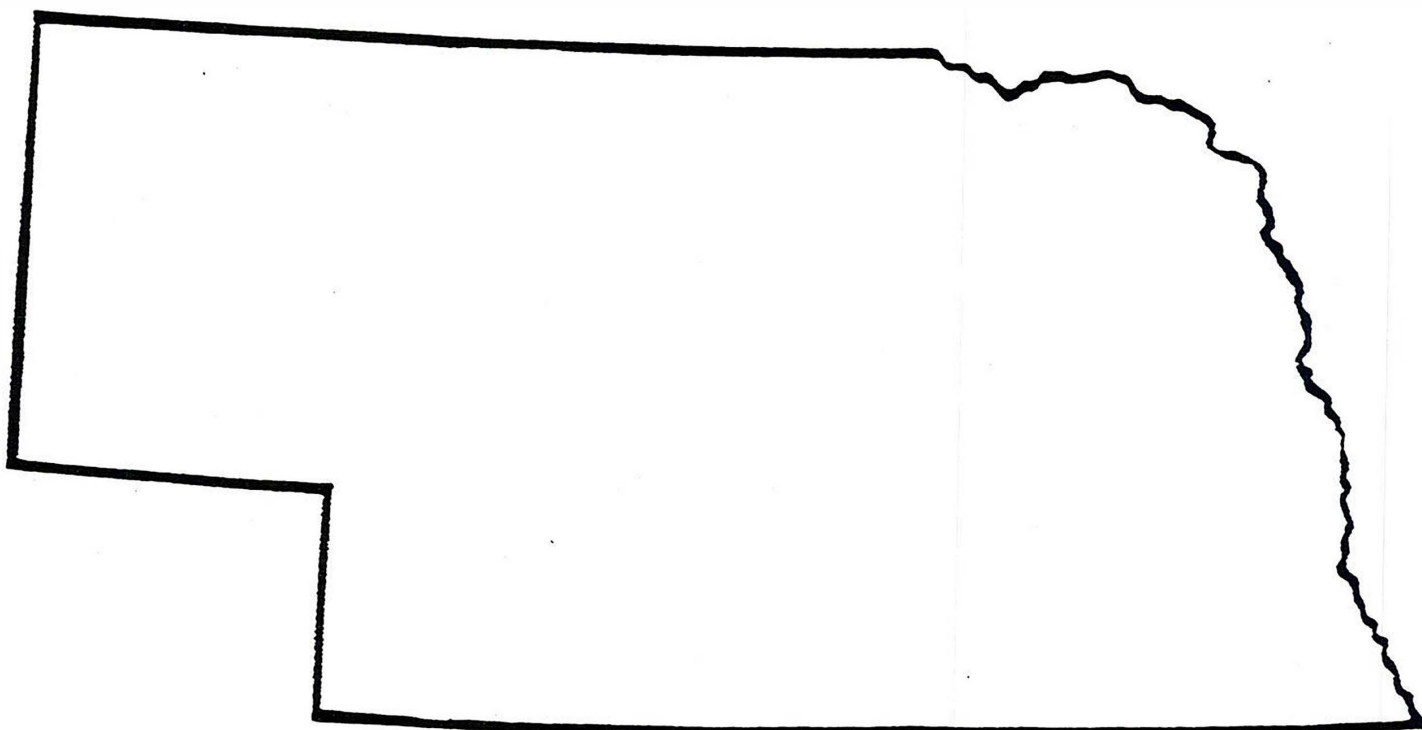
The Telecommunications Act of 1996 brought many changes to the regulatory world and our state statutes need to be modified to accurately reflect the current federal law. For example, Neb. Rev. Stat. Sec. 75-604 (Reissue 1994) does not allow local competition to occur unless the present local exchange provider is not adequately serving the area. The new law states that we will have more than one satisfactory provider, something not presently reflected in state statute. Obviously, the Act not only allows competition at the local level, but encourages it. Other state statutes should be examined to determine whether they are consistent with the federal act and whether they promote competition.

As described earlier, the Commission has established a state universal service task force. To empower the Commission to develop a state Universal Service Fund, we believe the legislature should address this topic and provide by statute the implementation of such a fund. A report from the task force is scheduled to be provided to the Commission in December, 1996, and will be available for the Legislature's consideration.

Another change in current law that needs to be addressed in 1996 is the statutory wording of the Nebraska Equipment Distribution Program. As discussed earlier, the program provides low-income individuals with hearing or speech disabilities, the opportunity to obtain specialized hearing impaired equipment, such as TDDs and amplifiers. The program is operating quite successfully; however, the program calls for the "distribution" of such equipment. After developing the program with the Nebraska Commission for the Hearing Impaired (NCHI) and the Materiel Division of DAS, it was determined that a voucher system, to allow participants to purchase their equipment would work better than a loan program. By using a voucher, persons may select a standard model or upgrade to a better model by adding their own money to the purchase. Further, it frees the state from having to maintain and repair the equipment. Therefore, the PSC will be asking the legislature to address the term "distribute" and redefine the term.

These pricing anomalies create uneconomic arbitrage opportunities that US West Communications must address as the local telecommunications market is opened for competitive entry.

Centrex Plus was developed for customers desirous of a system solution and was priced and structured to provide a competitive response to PBX based system solutions. US West Communications conducted extensive reviews to develop pricing that would be competitive as well as meeting our Modified Final Judgement (MFJ) compliance requirements. However, US West neither designed or priced Centrex Plus for small business users nor did US West anticipate that tariff arbitrage of basic telephone services would or could become a significant issue in the opening of competition in the local telecommunications market.

US West chooses to make Centrex Plus available for current customers in order to minimize any disruption to a customer's use of its telecommunications system and the customer's long term planning.
