#### **PSC Receives BEAD Grant Program Planning Funds**

The PSC has been awarded nearly five million dollars in initial planning funds from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) enabling it to begin the planning and pre-deployment process which includes hiring additional staff for the Broadband Equity, Access and Deployment (BEAD) grant program.

BEAD is a formal grant program that provides support to expand high -speed internet access by funding planning, infrastructure deployment, and adoption programs in all 50 states.

The initial planning funds will be utilized to generate a state broadband map, set up statewide outreach activities to stakeholders and enable the PSC to increase staffing to meet the needs of the program.

"We are excited to administer the BEAD program as we continue to build on efforts already underway to expand broadband access to all Nebraskans," Cullen Robbins, Director PSC Telecommunications/NUSF Department.

The PSC has begun recruiting for a number of position in connection with the BEAD grant program. Recruitment is currently underway for a <u>Grant Accountant</u> and two <u>Grant Auditors</u>. Additional positions that will be opening soon, will likely include:

- IT Support Specialist
- Accountant
- Administrative Assistant

During the five-and-a-half hour hearing the Commission took testimony from citizens who had experienced a telephone service outage or other service quality issues involving the carriers, CenturyLink, Windstream and Frontier. Representatives from the three carriers also attended the hearing and took questions from the Commission.

Citizens who were unable to provide in-person testimony were given the opportunity to submit written testimony to the Commission.

"The hearing and submitted comments allow the Commission to hear more about how these issues have directly affected the lives of citizens who have struggled to deal with them, often over extended periods of time," Cullen Robbins, Director Telecommunications/NUSF Department.

The Commission will take the information presented during the proceeding and determine its next steps.

#### State 911 Department Updates Legislative Committee

In December, the director of the state 911 department provided the Transportation and Telecommunications Committee of the Nebraska Legislature an update on the Next Generation 911 (NG911) Service System.

Director Dave Sankey told the committee that the migration of the state's Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) regions to the Emergency Service Internet Protocol Network (ESInet) was progressing, and that if everything continues as scheduled, all seven PSAP regions should be connected to the NG911 Service System by the end of the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of the new year.

What this essentially means is, the state is six-months away from achieving the vision from 2016, when the legislature passed LB938 creating the Service System Act and the development of a 911 Service System Implementation plan.

"We wouldn't be at this point today, without the devotion and hard work of the PSAPs, 911 Service System Advisory Committee (911SSAC), the 911 Wireless Advisory Board, consultants Mission Critical Partners, the State 911 Department staff and vendors Lumen & Intrado," Sankey said. "By working together, we are poised to bring NG911 technology to all who live, work or travel within the borders of our great state."

# Natural Gas Department Offer Tips to Help Prevent CARBON MONOXIDE

POISONING

It's called the silent killer and according to the <u>Centers for Disease Control</u> (<u>CDC</u>) and <u>Prevention</u> accidental Carbon Monoxide (CO) poisoning claims the lives of at least 430 people in the U.S. every year with some 50,000 people visiting emergency rooms each year.

Falling temperatures mean our home heating systems are turned on increasing the risks of CO poisoning. A colorless, odorless and tasteless gas, carbon monoxide can build up in enclosed or partially enclosed spaces. It is found in fumes produced by furnaces, kerosene heaters, vehicle exhausts, stoves, lanterns and gas ranges, portable generators or by burning charcoal or wood.

CO poisoning can mimic flu symptoms but comes on faster and affects everyone in the home. The most common symptoms are headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion. People who are sleeping can die from CO poisoning before ever having symptoms.

The following tips can help prevent CO poisoning:

- Install CO detectors in the hallways of living spaces and bedrooms on each floor of your home. Change the batteries every six months if your CO detector doesn't have a battery backup.
- Have your home heating system inspected each year by a qualified technician.
- Keep vents and flues free debris
- Never leave a motor vehicle running in an enclosed or partially enclose space, such as a garage.
- Never run a generator, pressure washer or any gasoline powered engine inside a basement, garage, or other enclosed structure, even if the doors or windows are open.
- Never use a charcoal grill, hibachi, lantern, or portable camping stove inside a home, tent or camper.
- If you suspect CO poisoning, call 911 right away.



# Transportation Department Opens Docket to Amend Railroad Rules & Regs

In November, the Commission opened a docket (Rule and Regulation No. 209) to amend <u>Title 291</u>, <u>Chapter 4</u>, Railroad Rules and Regulations.

"There have been changes to both state and federal law which requires a thorough review of these regulations," said Dillon Keiffer-Johnson, Director PSC Transportation Department. "We would expect to revise these rules in their entirety."

Comments for the first set of proposed rules on amendments to Chapter 4 which removes certain rules, updates language, and renumbers sections were due to the Commission on December 9.




#### Grain Department Participates in Annual AGRO Conference




