

IDENTIFICATION AND PRIORITIZATION OF ISSUES FOR WORKSHOP AND HEARING

Windstream Nebraska, Inc. ("Windstream") hereby submits the following recommendations regarding the Nebraska Public Service Commission's ("Commission") request in its *NUSF-139 Scheduling Order*¹ requesting interested parties to identify issues and recommend prioritization of issues for the March workshop and hearing.

Issue Identification and Prioritization

Windstream has identified the following priority issues related to this docket:

- A. Reform Timing with Rural Broadband Deployment: In light of the unprecedented levels of infrastructure grants coming from the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund ("RDOF"), the State Local Fiscal Recovery Fund ("SLFRF"), the Capital Projects Fund ("CPF") or the much anticipated Broadband Equity Access and Deployment Program ("BEAD"), which are all targeted at reaching he most rural areas of the state, Windstream believes it prudent to discuss if the Commission should take any reform actions at this time. With these programs in various steps of the "build" phase and with BEAD not even yet in an application phase, it will be nearly impossible to assess what the support needs will be in the future.
- B. Cost Modeling Reform: Windstream understands that as part of this review effort the Commission

is seeking ways to increase provider participation in the Universal Service Funded projects.

Windstream believes it would be prudent to discuss during the workshop reverting the program

back to the project-based model that was previously in place along with modernizing the cost-

based modeling to reflect current costs.

C. Competitive Areas: As competition increases, spreading further into rural areas in light of the

federal programs described above, incumbent local exchange carriers should have the ability to

relinquish receipt of support in exchange for deregulation or a form of alternative regulation.

During the workshop the Parties should discuss a pathway to allow for light-touch or not-touch

regulation in areas where competition exists. This discussion is also helpful to determine what the

future of the program may look like.

D. Alternative Uses of USF Support: The Parties should discuss if there are alternative uses outside

of broadband deployment that could be supported by USF, for example support for carriers

incurring expenses related to the transition to next-generation 911 or projects to support Precision

Agriculture, which extends deployed broadband from the home to the State's agricultural facilities.

Conclusion

Windstream appreciates the opportunity to provide its feedback and recommendations on the

issues and priorities of those issues in response to the NUSF-139 Scheduling Order. Windstream looks

forward to its continued participation in this proceeding.
